Sunday, December 25th (Christmas Day)

First Reading from Isaiah 62:11-12 - The Lord proclaims to the ends of the earth that a savior is coming. You shall be called holy people who have been redeemed by the Lord.

Responsorsial Psalm 97:1, 6, 11-12 - "A light will shine on us this day: the Lord is born for us."

Epistle Reading from the Letter of Paul to Titus 3:4-7 - Kindness and generous love from God comes to us not because of what we have done but because of the mercy of God. God has renewed us by sending us the Holy Spirit though Jesus Christ, our Savior. Thus we become heirs in the hope of eternal life.

Gospel of Luke 2:15-20 - When the angels left the shepherds, they said among themselves that they should go to Bethlehem to see what the Lord has made known to them. Thereupon, they found Mary and Joseph and the baby lying in a manger. The told all they encountered what the angels had told them, which Mary kept in her heart; and the shepherds returned to their fields glorifying and praising God for all they had been told and all they had seen for themselves.

Sunday, January 1st (Solemnity of Mary)

First Reading from Numbers 6:22-27 - The Lord tells Moses how to bless the Israelites so God will fulfill the blessing.

Responsorsial Psalm 67:2-3, 5, 6, 8 - "May God bless us in his mercy."

Epistle Reading from Paul's Letter to the Galatians 4:4-7 - God sent His Son, born of a woman, to ransom those born under the law, who will become adopted as children of the Lord, so that all be heirs of the Father.

Gospel of Luke 2:16-21 - The story of the shepherds finding the baby Jesus and His parents. Eight days later, the baby was circumcised and given the name of Jesus. Mary kept all these things in her heart.

Sunday, January 8th (Epiphany Celebrated)

First Reading from the Prophet Isaiah 60:1-6 - Jerusalem is lifted up in splendor; the glory of the Lord will shine on the city. Camels from the east will come with gifts of gold and frankincense and proclaim the praises of the Lord.

Responsorsial Psalm 72:1-2, 7-8, 10-11, 12-13 - "Lord, every nation on earth will adore you."

Epistle Reading from Paul's Letter to the Ephesians 3:2-3, **5-6 - 3:2-3a**, **5-6 -** Paul says that the mystery was made known to him and the apostles by revelation. The stewardship of God's grace is now being spread even to the Gentiles.

Gospel of Matthew 2:1-12 - The story of the Magi visiting Herod to discover the location where the child might have been born. When they continue to follow the star, they are led to the location where the child Jesus was, and they offered Him praise and gave Him gifts from their treasures. See page 6 in this bulletin for more information about these Magi.

CONTINUED SUNDAY MASS READINGS FOR JANUARY

Sunday, January 15th (Second Sunday in Ordinary Time)

First Reading from the Prophet Isaiah 49:3, **5-6** - The Lord said to Isaiah that he would be lifted up and made to be a servant of God. He was made glorious in the sight of God and thus has been made a light to all nations.

Responsorsial Psalm 40:2, 4, 7-8, 8-9, 10 - "Here am I, Lord; I come to do your will."

Epistle Reading from Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians 1:1-3 - The opening lines of the letter to the Christian community in Corinth, wherein Paul tells the people that he has been called to be an apostle of Christ by the will of God. He sends grace and peace from Gold and the Lord Jesus Christ to all those in Corinth who will listen to his message.

Gospel of John 1:29-34 - While John was baptizing in the Jorden, he saw Jesus approaching and told the crowds that Jesus was the Lamb of God, that the Spirit came down from heaven and rested on Jesus; and that he, John, baptizes with water but that Jesus will baptize with the Holy Spirit as He is the Son of God.

Sunday, January 22nd (Third Sunday in Ordinary Time)

First Reading from the Prophet Isaiah 8:23—9:3 - Where there used to be distress in the region of the Jordan, now a light has been shown. Those who had walked in the darkness have seen that great light. Abundant joy and great rejoicing has overtaken the people. The yoke that had burden them has been smashed by the Lord.

Responsorsial Psalm 27:1, 4, 13-14 - "The Lord is my light and my salvation."

Epistle Reading from Pauls First Letter to the Corinthians 1:10-13, 17 - Paul urges his readers to be united in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ and not to be divided among themselves. The rivalries that had arisen between people who profess allegiance to Paul or Apollos or Cephas or Jesus must cease. They were baptized in the name of Jesus, not the others, and it was Jesus who was crucified for them, not the others.

Gospel of Matthew 4:12-23 - When Jesus heard that John had been arrested, He left Nazareth and went to Galilee to begin his teaching, saying, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." While at the Sea of Galilee, Jesus saw Peter and his brother Andrew casting their nests into the sea. Jesus called them to be His followers and they complied. Jesus then saw two brothers, James and John, who were in their boat with their father Zebedee. He called them and they too left the boat to follow Jesus. They went around Galilee, curing illnesses and proclaiming the gospel of the kingdom of God.

Sunday, January 29th (Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time)

First Reading from the Book of Zephaniah 2:3; 3:12-13 - Seek justice and seek humility; in that way, you will be saved on the day of the Lord's anger. The righteous will speak no lies and do no wrong. They shall pasture their flocks and none will disturb them.

Responsorsial Psalm 146:6-7, 8-9, 9-10 - "Blessed are the poor in spirit; the kingdom of heaven is theirs!"

Epistle Reading from Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians 1:26-31 - You may not be of noble birth and may not be the powerful of the world, but God has chosen you to be wise in the eyes of the Lord. You have been designated to be righteous, sanctified and redeemed in the name of Jesus Christ.

Gospel of Matthew 5:1-12 - This is the well-known story of the Sermon on the Mount. When the crowds appeared, Jesus went up onto a mountain and began to teach his disciples: "Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven . . ." and so on through a total of nine "Blessed be's" or nine Beatitudes. Read them ahead of time and read them again after Mass. They stress that even those who lack material goods stand to receive spiritual blessings as promised by God. This contrasts with the common thought of the day that those afflicted by illness or poverty are in that condition because of their sinfulness. Jesus strikes that notion down by this sermon.




ANOTHER BIG THANK-YOU

DON'T BE FOOLED

The trivia question a year ago about the Epiphany (January 6th but celebrated this year on Sunday, January 8th) tried to fool you about details of the Magi. Remember that based solely on scripture, we don't actually know the number of visitors from the East - we assume three because they gifted the Christ child with three gifts. Magi is plural so we assume at least two, but could well have been more than three. Also, based solely on scripture, we shouldn't refer to them as "Kings" as Matthew's Gospel (which is the only Gospel to tell their story) mentions them only as "wise men from the east." Since they were aware of star patterns, we might assume that they may have been astrologers. And of course; we see three kings and three camels in all crèche nativity scenes in the stable around the shepherds and the other farm animals. Matthew does not mention that they arrived on camels, but camels are mentioned in Isaiah 60:5-6 as bearing gifts to Jerusalem. And one more note: Matthew refers to their arriving at the "house where Jesus and Mary were" - not at the birth stable - so Jesus was likely a child at that point and not a newborn baby, and certainly not in a stable. This timing is further validated when we read that Herod had all babies younger than 2 years old murdered in an attempt to kill the baby Jesus. Hope that doesn't spoil your singing "We Three Kings of Orient Are." If you're interested in learning more about who the Magi really were, here's a book to explore: "Mystery of the Magi" - the Quest to Identify the Three Wise Men, by Fr. Dwight Longenecker.



CHALLENGE FOR JANUARY

A **pyx** (from the Latin: pyxis, a transliteration of Greek: $\pi v \xi i \zeta$, a box or receptacle) is a small round container used in Catholic Churches to carry the Eucharist (consecrated hosts), to the sick or those who are otherwise unable to come to church in order to receive Holy Communion.

It is often about the size of a pocket watch and usually made of brass or other metals, traditionally lined with gold. A fabric or leather pouch in which the pyx may be carried is known as a "burse." Typically, this kind of burse can be securely closed and is fixed with cords so that the priest, deacon, or extraordinary minister of Holy Communion can affix it to his or her person during transport to the recipient of Communion.

Just after Communion is distributed to the congregation at Holy Family, watch for the deacon to take one or more pyx at the altar and place a consecrated host into it. The pyx is then given to an extraordinary minister after Mass to take to the homebound or nursing home inhabitant where they perform a prayer ritual and offer the Eucharist to the recipient.
