ASH WEDNESDAY & LENT SCHEDULE

Masses (with distribution of ashes): 8:30 am and 7:00 pm

Distribution of ashes: From 9:30 to 11:30 am and 12:15 to 3:30 pm

Stations of the Cross each Friday in Lent at 7:00 pm



FAST AND ABSTINENCE

Ash Wednesday is a day of fasting for those aged 18-59. This means eating only one full meal and two smaller meals on this day that don't equal a full meal (and refraining from snacks throughout the day). Exemptions exist for the sick, elderly, and pregnant/nursing women.

In addition, on **Ash Wednesday** and all **Fridays** during Lent, practicing Catholics aged 14 and above abstain from eating any meat which comes from birds or mammals specifically. You can eat seafood such as fish or shrimp. You can eat eggs and dairy products. You can eat broth made from animal products. Again, exemptions exist for health reasons. The goal is spiritual growth, self-discipline, and remembrance of Jesus' sacrifice. See page 6 for more information about Lent.

My Dear Family of God:





CHALLENGE # 1

Only one (of the 56) signers of the Declaration of Independence was a Catholic: Charles Carroll from Maryland. Of all of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, Carroll was one of the wealthiest and most formally educated. A product of his 17-year [Jesuit](#) education in France, Charles Carroll spoke five languages fluently, and became a Senator from Maryland when the first U.S. Congress was formed.

His younger brother, John Carroll, was also educated in Europe by the Jesuits, and joined that Order, becoming a priest. He came to America and started a boys' school on the Potomac River in an area called Georgetown, named after George Washington. John Carroll, SJ, became the first Catholic bishop - and then archbishop - of Baltimore, the oldest U.S. diocese.

Of other signers of the Declaration and other Founding Fathers, George Washington was raised Anglican and was an active Episcopalian. John Adams was raised in the Puritan tradition and was an active Congregationalist, believing in Jesus as redeemer. Thomas Jefferson followed the Unitarian tradition, believing in a Creator God, but looking upon Jesus only as a teacher, not believing in the Divinity of Christ, all the while believing in individual conscience.

Extra credit: Although Abraham Lincoln was not a Founding Father, we do celebrate his birthday this month. Lincoln was raised Baptist but never joined any church. His faith was characterized by deep scriptural knowledge (quoting scripture often), moral conviction, and an appreciation for God's providence to get us thru the Civil War.

CHALLENGE # 2

Our word LENT is derived from the Old English word *lencten*, meaning "spring season," which itself comes from a Dutch word *lente*, signifying "long," as in these (Lenten) days are becoming longer as spring approaches.

MORE ABOUT LENT

Beginning about six weeks before Easter, Lent is a time traditionally set aside for fasting, prayer, and reflection in preparation to celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus Christ. It is one of the most enduring seasons in the Christian liturgical calendar with some elements dating to perhaps earlier than the second century. The earliest observances of Lent seem to have focused particularly on the practice of fasting. Church records suggest that the fast applied at first mainly to new converts as a period of repentance and reflection before their baptism at Easter. In any case, Lent quickly became a general practice Church-wide. By the 800s, the strictness of the fast began to relax. By the 1400s, Christians had begun eating one main meal early in the day, and later began to add a smaller meal to keep up their strength for work. Eventually, the one-meal restriction was lifted altogether, and new practices emerged, like the idea of giving up some luxury or need as a personal sacrifice for the season. Over time, "giving something up" became the centerpiece of Lent.

But over the years, Lent has become less strict in almost every Western tradition. In the Catholic Church, for example, the number of obligatory fasting days decreased incrementally from six days a week to three, and then eventually, to just two in the whole season of Lent: Ash Wednesday and Good Friday (see the cover). The well known "fish on Friday" tradition began in the United States in 1966 when the Pope affirmed the abstinence from "flesh" on all Fridays. This too has been relaxed to abstaining only Fridays in Lent. In every tradition, however, the act of "giving something up" has remained strong.

The forty-day time for Lent (Ash Wednesday through Holy Saturday excluding Sundays) mirrors Jesus' 40 days in the desert, and also equals Moses' and Elijah's fasts, which for us symbolizes spiritual preparation, leading up to the glorious feast of Jesus' Resurrection (Easter).

FIRST WEEK IN LENT

Read Matthew 4:1-11 (Jesus in the wilderness and being tempted by the devil). Our practice this week is to pay attention to the times in our lives when our faith is tested.

SECOND WEEK IN LENT

Read John 3:1-7 (Nicodemus invited to be born again). Our practice this week is to open our hearts and imagine a new life that God is inviting us to in our own rebirth and the rebirth of the world.

SUNDAY MASS READINGS FOR FEBRUARY

Sunday, January 25th (Third Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Book of Isaiah 8:23—9:3 - The anguish of the people has been conquered. The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light. Those who dwelt in gloom, a light has shone.

Responsive Psalm 27:1, 4, 13-14 - "The Lord is my light and my salvation."

Epistle Reading from the First Letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians 1:10-13, 17 - Paul tells the Church in Corinth that there should be no divisions among themselves. He chastises them about the rivalries that have arise between factions of the Church. He reminded them that it is not himself, Paul, who was crucified and rose, but that it was Christ who shares the wisdom of the ages.

Gospel of Matthew 4:12-23 - Jesus becomes disturbed when He hears that John had been arrested. Jesus left Nazareth and began teaching and preaching in Galilee, beyond the Jordan River. He told the people that they should repent for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand. At the Sea of Galilee, Jesus called to two fishermen, Peter and his brother Andrew, and told them to follow Him, which they did. He also called James and his brother John, and they too followed Him, teaching and proclaiming the Good News and curing diseases and illnesses among the people.

Sunday, February 1st (Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from Zephaniah 2:3; 3:12-13: The people of the Lord are humble, doing no wrong and speaking no lies. They will take refuge in the Lord and will seek justice, nurturing their flocks.

Responsive Psalm 146:6-10 - "Blessed are the poor in spirit; the kingdom of heaven is theirs!"

Epistle Reading from the First Letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians 1:26-31 - The chosen are in Christ Jesus, holding on to wisdom, righteousness and redemption. God chose them to shame the wise, shame the strong and not boast before God.

Gospel of Matthew 5:1-12 - The well-known Sermon on the Mount (the "Blessed be's . . .").

Sunday, February 8th (Fifth Sunday n Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Book of Isaiah 58:7-10 - Share your bread, shelter the oppressed, clothe the naked. In this way, when you cry out to the Lord, He will answer with "I am here." Light will rise from the darkness and gloom shall be no more.

Responsive Psalm 112:4-9 - "The just man is a light in darkness to the upright."

Epistle Reading from the First Letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians 2:1-5 - Paul told the Christian Community in Corinth that he was sent to them with weakness and fear, and that he had no wisdom except knowing about the crucified Jesus Christ. It was the Spirit that put the words of wisdom into his mouth so that the people's wisdom came not from humans such as himself but from the power of God.

Gospel of Matthew 5:13-16 - The parables of the salt and of the light. If you are the light of the world, you cannot be hidden. Just as a lamp is not put under a basket, but is set where it gives light to the entire household. Your light must shine before others so that they may see your good deeds and that you will be glorified in God.

Sunday, February 15th (Sixth Sunday n Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Book of Sirach 15:15-20 - Keep the Commandments. Trust in God. Choose life and goodness. The wisdom of the Lord is immense and all-powerful. God does not command us to act unjustly nor does He give us license to sin.

Responsive Psalm 119:1-2, 4-5, 17-18, 33-34 - "Blessed are they who follow the law of the Lord!"

Epistle Reading from St Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians 2:6-10 - Paul speaks not out of human wisdom, but out of God's wisdom. God has prepared glory for those who love Him. All of this has been revealed to us through the Spirit.

Gospel of Matthew 5:17-37 - Jesus says that He has not come to abolish the law of the prophets but to fulfill it. Anyone who breaks the Commandments will be the least in the kingdom of heaven. You must surpass the righteousness of the Pharisees or you will not enter the kingdom of heaven. Jesus then expands on the Commandments and challenges the people even more.

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Sunday, February 22nd (First Sunday of Lent)

A reading from Genesis 2:7-9; 3:1-7 - After the story of Creation, this is the story of Adam and Eve in the Garden of Eden and how the serpent tricked them into disobeying God and the result of their sin.

Responsive Psalm 51:3-4, 5-6, 12-13, 17 - "Be merciful, O Lord, for we have sinned."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans 5:12-19 - Paul tells the people how sin entered the world through Adam. But those who share in the abundance of grace will come to life through Jesus Christ for through obedience, many will be made righteous.

Gospel of Matthew 4:1-11 - The story of Jesus going into the desert for forty days where He prayed before beginning his public ministry. It was there that He was tempted three times by the devil but refused each temptation.

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Sunday, March 1st (Second Sunday of Lent)

A reading from Genesis 12:14 - The Lord tells Abraham that he should go into the Promised Land and a great nation will come forth from his descendants who will be blessed. Abraham trusted in the Lord and did as he was directed..

Responsive Psalm 33:4-5, 18-22 - "Lord, let your mercy be on us, as we place our trust in you."

Epistle Reading from the Second Letter of Timothy 1:8-10 - Timothy tells the people they will be able to bear all hardships with the strength that comes from God. God calls us to a holy life and Christ bestows grace on all. He destroyed death and brought immortality through the Word of the Gospel.

Gospel of Matthew 17:1-9 - The account of the Transfiguration of Jesus on the mountain top appears in all four Gospels. This is Matthew's version that includes Peter, James and John experiencing Jesus becoming shining with His clothes becoming dazzling white. They experience the presence of Moses and Elijah and hear the voice of God speaking from a cloud. The disciples were fearful, but Jesus assured them that they should not be afraid but that they should reserve what they saw and heard in their hearts.
