SAINTS

According to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops: All Christians are called to be saints. Saints are persons in heaven (officially canonized or not), who lived heroically virtuous lives, offered their life for others, or were martyred for the faith, and who are worthy of imitation. In official Church procedures there are three steps to formal sainthood: a candidate becomes "Venerable," then "Blessed" and then declared a "Saint." Venerable is the title given to a deceased per-son recognized formally by the pope as having lived an heroically virtuous life or offered their life. To be beatified and recognized as Blessed, one miracle acquired through the candidate's intercession is required in addition to recognition of heroic virtue or offering of life. Canonization requires a second miracle after beatification. This official process of canonization was formalized around 1000 AD and over 3000 saints have thus been canonized and recognized by the Church. Pope Francis alone canonized 911 saints, with his predecessor Pope Benedict XVI having canonized only 45 saints.

CHALLENGE FOR JULY

This is a bit of a trick question as **ALL** of the listed names are recognized by the Church as **Saints** (whom we believe by faith are united with God in heaven). Here is information about each with their July feast date:

[A] July 1 - St. Padre Junipero Serra. A Spanish-born Franciscan Friar who was sent to Mexico by his order and then to Upper California where he founded 15 of California's 21 Missions. He was canonized a Saint by Pope John Paul II in 2015. Extra credit trivia: each state is afforded two statues in the U.S Capitol, and due to his significance in California history, Serra has been chosen as one of the two statues from California.



[B] July 3 - St. Thomas the Apostle. Known in the scriptures also as "Didymus" or "Twin." And known by us all as "Doubting Thomas." We remember him for his expression "My Lord and my God," which is a prayer recited by many as they receive Communion.

[C] July 6 - St. Maria Goretti. An 11-year old Italian girl martyred when she was killed by a neighbor whom she told would commit a mortal sin and would go to hell if he raped her. She is recognized as the youngest person to be canonized by the Church.

[D] July 14 - St. Kateri Tekakwitha. From the Mohawk Tribe in upper New York who converted to Christianity and was baptized which was opposed by her own tribe. She was devoted to the Eucharist and pious in her prayer and charitable works. She was the first canonized saint to have been born in what is now America.



[E] July 22 - St. Mary Magdalene. She has been erroneously thought to be a courtesan, which is not the case. She was a witness to the Crucifixion and the Resurrection as a devoted follower and close ally of Jesus and was mentioned in all four Gospels. She was recognized as a saint early in the Church's history.

[F] July 26 - Saints Joachim and Anne. Although not in the Bible, according to non-canonical sources Anne and Joachim are considered as Mary's parents. They are treated as saints and are given the titles of the Patron Saints of Grandparents.

[G] July 29 - Saints Martha, Mary and Lazarus. Stories in the Gospels identify these three siblings as close friends to Jesus. One of those stories identifies the sisters as integral players in a meal that Jesus was invited to (Sunday, July 20th Gospel). And John's Gospel tells the important story of Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead.

CHALLENGE FOR JULY (CONT.)

[H] July 31 - St. Ignatius of Loyola. Born Iñigo, he was the youngest of thirteen children in a noble family in Loyola, Spain. Seeking fame, he enrolled in the local army at 17. He was wounded by a cannonball and had to have his leg repaired. While recovering, he read a book about Saints and decided to convert to Catholicism. After studies in theology and Latin, he was ordained and asked Pope Paul III for permission to establish a missionary order, now known as the Jesuits (or Society of Jesus). He was canonized 66 years after his death.

D.E.I.

We are all aware of the political turmoil surrounding D.E.I. (Diversity / Equity / Inclusion). Have you ever thought about the life and teachings of Jesus which emphasize love, compassion and welcoming all people as proclaiming Diversity, Equity and Inclusion? Let's look at how each one of these is exemplified by Jesus:

Diversity is clear in the people Jesus chooses to have around him as followers and recipients of His Good News. Many examples appear in the Gospels: The Word of Jesus was spread to Gentiles as well as Jews; He healed a Roman soldier's servant and a Syrian woman's daughter and spoke to a Samaritan woman at a well. Jesus tells us that there is a place in God's Heaven for everyone, regardless of differences.

Equity is clear in rights and privileges as all God's children have a place in heaven: women as well as men, slaves and free, the rich and the poor. Justice and mercy belong to all, especially those who are confronted by unjust systems. No one deserves to be hungry.

Inclusion is clear when Jesus dines with sinners and tax collectors, heals unclean lepers, lets sinful women touch Him, welcomes poor people and outcasts to banquets and befriends the handicapped, the blind, the deaf, the lame, etc. Jesus says we should love all inclusively, not just those who might love us in return.

Let us pray that Holy Family Parish (collectively and individually) lives out our Christian values in keeping with the teachings and examples of Jesus as above. Look around yourself at Mass and celebrate what makes us who we are: **Diverse, Equitable and Inclusive.**

A Disciples of Christ minister from the East Bay, the Rev. Lataunya Bynum, has suggested that all parishes and all parishioners of all denominations add our own terms to the D.E.I. mantra. The ones she suggests are **Diligence, Excellence and Imagination**. How might those specifications enter into our parish life? Consider ==>

Diligence - Sticking to your principles. Be persistent in your effort to live out a life as Jesus would have you do. Attend Mass with attention, say your prayers daily, receive the sacraments, and listen to the Word of God spoken during the Mass and in the Scriptures.

Excellence - Be a part of making Holy Family the "Friendliest Little Parish in the Valley." We all have a part to play to make us outstanding, whether as a choir member, lector, EM, usher, contributor, member of a parish organization (Women's Club, Men's Club, Knights of Columbus, MFC, Hispanic group, etc.), CCD teacher, Pastoral Council, Finance Committee, Environment and cleaning groups, usher, collector. We are all in this together striving for excellence.

Imagination or Inventiveness - How can you be creative and live out your faith by sharing something personal and unique with your God?

Come up with your own private, secret action or mantra that only you and God will know. Maybe:

- † If your voice is not up to singing aloud, try to mouth the words, thinking them in your mind and "singing them" in your heart.
- † When you receive Communion, you bow your head in reverence to Jesus in the host. How about bowing your head in solitude every time you hear the word "Jesus" during Mass prayers, scripture readings or during the sermon?
- † And after the "Amen" and receiving the host, say a personal, private interjection (such as "My Lord and my God") on the way back to your seat.
- † Upon entering or leaving the sanctuary, a private touch of a special statue in church whose figure is important in your life.
- † Following the raising of the host and chalice at the Consecration, how about making a bow of the head to welcome Jesus to the altar?
- † Choose a Station of the Cross to meditate on (inside the sanctuary or in the parking lot), and each Sunday on your way into or out of Mass, pause at that Station and privately say a personal, special prayer.

These are only a few possibilities. Be creative and be diligent about some special action or prayer that only you and God are aware of.

SUNDAY MASS READINGS FOR JULY

Sunday, June 29th (Feast of Saints Peter and Paul)

A reading from Acts of the Apostles 12:1-11 - King Herod had arrested members of The Way and had the Apostle James killed for his preaching about Jesus. He also arrested Peter and put him in prison. During the night, Peter was sleeping between two guards when an angel of the Lord appeared as a shining light and told Peter to get up and quickly leave. The chains fell from his wrists and the iron gate was opened for them. Peter walked past the guards and proclaimed that the Lord had sent an angel to rescue him from the hand of Herod.

Responsive Psalm 34:2-9 - "The angel of the Lord will rescue those who fear him."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Second Letter to Timothy 4:6-8, 17-18 - Paul tells Timothy that he, Paul, has completed the race and has kept the faith. He exhorts Timothy to do the same and the Lord will stand by him and give him strength - just as the Lord did for Paul. The Lord rescued him from evil and brought him safely to the Kingdom of Heaven.

Gospel of Matthew 16:13-19 - Jesus asked His disciples who people say that He is. They told Jesus that some say He is John the Baptist or Elijah or Jeremiah. But Jesus pressed Peter, asking him who he thinks Jesus is, and Peter replied that He was the Christ (the Anointed), the Son of God. Jesus then pronounced that Peter was the Rock upon which the Church would be built. Jesus gave Peter the Keys to the Kingdom of Heaven and created the sacrament of Reconciliation, saying what Peter and the Apostles bound on earth would be bound in heaven and whatever they would loose on earth would be loosed in heaven. Note: Remember that Peter's original name was Simon Bar Jonah (Simon Son of Jonah), but his name was changed to Peter, which comes from the Latin word *petrus* meaning "rock."

Sunday, July 6th (14th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from Isaiah 66:10-14 - Do not mourn for Jerusalem. Instead rejoice for her because the Lord will spread prosperity over Jerusalem and allow its inhabitants to find comfort and joy in the Lord.

Responsive Psalm 66:1-3, 4-5, 6-7, 16, 20 - "Let all the earth cry out to God with joy."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Galatians 6:14-18 - May the grace of the Lord be with everyone. Peace and mercy to all who bear the marks of the crucified Jesus for you are a new creation in the Lord.

Gospel of Luke 10:1-12, 17-20 - Jesus sends out 72 disciples to spread His good news. They should stay with those who welcome them, cure the sick and tell the people that the Kingdom of God is at hand.

Sunday, July 13th (15th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from Deuteronomy 30:10-14 - Heed the voice of the Lord, keep His commandments and obey His laws. Praise the Lord with all your heart and soul. Carry out the commands of God.

Responsive Psalm 69:14, 17, 30-31, 33-34, 36, 37 - "Turn to the Lord in your need, and you will live."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Colossians 1:15-20 - Jesus is the image of the invisible God. In Him, all things were created; and through Him, all things are held together. All things have been reconciled through Him by the blood of the cross.

Gospel of Lue 10:25-37 - Jesus was tested by a scholar of the law who asked Him what must be done to inherit eternal life? Jesus reminded the man of the command to love God with all your herd and soul and love his neighbor as himself in order to gain eternal life. When the man asked Jesus who his neighbor was, Jesus used the parable of the good Samaritan, with which we are all familiar.

Sunday, July 20th (16th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from Genesis 18:1-10 - Abraham stopped three travelers passing by his tent and invited them to rest a while and have a cup of water. He then offered them food for their journey and had his wife Sarah prepare bread and had his servants prepare meat for the strangers. After the three had eaten, one of them prophesied to Abraham that Sarah (who was barren) would deliver a son within a year.

Responsive Psalm 15:2-3, 3-4, 5 - "He who does justice will live in the presence of the Lord."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Colossians 1:24-28 - Paul writes to the people that he is willing to suffer for their sake because God has sent him to them to preach to them the glory of the mystery of Christ.

Gospel of Luke 10:38-42 - The story of Jesus traveling to the house of Mary and Martha (see page 2 of this bulletin) for a meal. While Martha prepared the meal, Mary sat at the feet of Jesus and listened to Him preach. Martha chided Mary for not helping with the meal and complained to Jesus. Jesus told Martha to allow her sister to be, for she chose the better way which will not be taken away from her.

Sunday, July 27th (17th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from Genesis 18:20-32 - Abraham is confronted by the Lord about the sinfulness of the people in Sodom and Gomorrah and threatens to destroy the two cities. Abraham's response was that in destroying the evil ones in the cities, God would also sweep away the innocent along with the guilty. Abraham bargained with God that if he could find 50, 40, 30, 20, or even just 10 innocent people, would He spare the cities, and God answered that for the sake of those innocent people among the rest, He would not destroy the cities.

Responsive Psalm Psalm 138:1-2, 2-3, 6-7, 7-8 - "Lord, on the day I called for help, you answered me."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Colossians 2:12-14 - All were buried with Christ in baptism and all have been raised with Him by His Resurrection. Even when we are buried in our transgressions, we will be brought back to life and forgiven our sins because of the cross.

Gospel of Luke 11:1-13 - After Jesus was praying by Himself, His Apostles asked Him to teach them how to pray, and He gave them the words of the Lord's Prayer (the "Our Father"). Jesus then teaches them using the parable of a man who goes to a friend's house at midnight asking for bread in order to feed an unexpected guest. Will the owner of the house send him away or treat him like a friend? So too, Jesus tells them, the Father will give the Holy Spirit to those who ask. Seek and you will find - knock and the door will be opened! Whoever asks will be answered and whoever seeks will find.

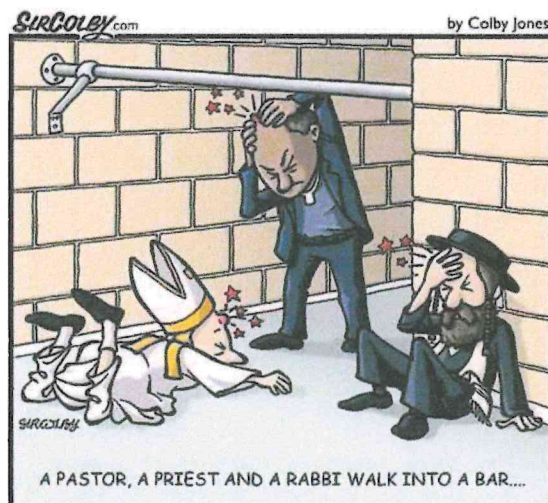


We continue recycling at Holy Family to raise funds for our "Pay Off the Loan" project.

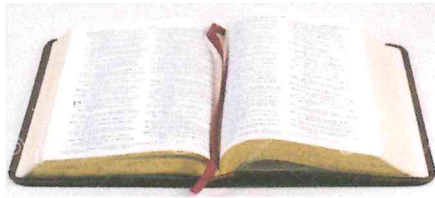
Please save PET plastic bottles and aluminum cans. No liquids should remain in the bottles when you turn them in. **VERY IMPORTANT: CAPS MUST**
