# SUNDAY MASS READINGS FOR MARCH

### Sunday, March 5th (Second Sunday of Lent)

**First Reading from Genesis 12:1-4 -** The calling of Abram to become Abraham and be the father of a great nation. Abram trusted in the Lord, went and did what the Lord commanded and he became blessed.

Responsorial Psalm 33:4-5, 18-19, 20, 22 - "Lord, let your mercy be on us, as we place our trust in you."

**Epistle Reading from the Second Letter from Paul to Timothy 1:8-10 -** Bear your hardships, for strength will come to you from the Lord. Through the appearance of our savior, Christ Jesus, He destroyed death and brought life and immortality to light through the good news of the Gospel.

**Gospel of Matthew 17:1-9 -** Jesus took Peter, James and John to a high mountain and there He was transfigured before them. His face shone like the sun and his clothes became white like pure light. God spoke out of the clouds glorifying Jesus as His Son and telling those gathered to listen to - and heed - what He says. Peter said that it was good that they were there to witness this, but Jesus told him not to tell anyone about the event until He was raised from the dead.

### Sunday, March 12th (Third Sunday of Lent)

**First Reading from Exodus 17:3-7 -** As the Israelites wandered in the desert, they grumbled against Moses because of the lack of water. The Lord told Moses to take his staff and, in the sight of the people, strike a rock on the Mount of Horab. Moses obeyed, and when he struck the rock, abundant water flowed out of the rock and quenched the thirst of the entire cohort. The Israelites had tested the Lord but then they believed in His power.

Responsorial Psalm 95:1-2, 6-7, 8-9 - "If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts."

**Epistle Reading from Paul's Letter to the Romans 5:1-2, 5-8 -** Paul tells the believers that the have been justified in their faith, that they are at peace with God, and that they have hope in the glory of God. The love of the Spirit has been poured into their hearts, just like water is poured.

**Gospel of John 4:5-42** - The long story of Jesus approaching the Samaritan woman at the well and asking her for a drink of water. She is amazed that Jesus is asking that of her, a foreigner. Jesus tells her that one day she will receive living water and that she will never again thirst. Jesus then tells her about her past, which astonishes the woman. She tells Jesus that He must be a prophet and wants Him to tell her when the awaited-for Messiah will appear. Jesus tells her that He is the one, and she believer. She goes to tell the townsfolk about Jesus and what he know, what he says, and what he has done, and many believed in Him on the testimony of the woman.

### Sunday, March 19th (Fourth Sunday of Lent)

**First Reading from 1 Samuel 16:1, 6-7, 10-13 -** The Lord told Samuel to take his horn with oil and proceed to the house of Jesse of Bethlehem. Samuel was to anoint one of Jesse's sons to become King. When Samuel met seven of Jesse's sons, he reports that the Lord did not want him to anoint any of them. He asked whether Jesse had any other sons, and was told only one, the youngest who was tending the flock in the fields. Samuel told Jesse to call for the boy and Lord told Samuel that this one was the one to anoint. The name of the youngest was David, and after being anointed, the Spirit of the Lord was upon him.

Responsorial Psalm 23: 1-3, 3-4, 5, 6 - "The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want."

**Epistle Reading from Paul's Letter to the Ephesians 5:8-14 -** Paul tells the believers that once they were in darkness, but now they are in the light. The Lord will raise them from the dead and give them eternal life.

**Gospel of John 9:1-41** - The long story of Jesus encountering the man blind from birth. The disciples ask Jesus if the blindness was caused by the sin of the man or of his parents. Jesus belittles that idea and he puts mud over the man's eyes and tells him to wash it off in the pool. When the man does so, he miraculously gains his sight.

### Sunday, March 26th (Fifth Sunday of Lent)

**First Reading from Ezekiel 37:12-14** - The Lord tells the people that He will open the graves of their dead and provide them with eternal life. The Spirit of the Lord will rest within all and they all shall live. This is God's promise.

Responsorial Psalm 130:1-2, 3-4, 5-6, 7-8 - "With the Lord there is mercy and fullness of redemption."

**Epistle Reading from Paul's Letter to the Romans 8:8-11 -** The Spirit of the Lord is alive in all. It is the same Spirit that raised Jesus from the dead. The Spirit of righteousness is alive in your mortal bodies.

Gospel of John 11:1-45 - Jesus traveled to Bethany to the town where His friends Mary, Martha and Lazarus lived. This was because He had heard that Lazarus had died. Mary and Martha were perturbed with Jesus for they felt that if He had come earlier, he could have saved their brother from dying. But Jesus said that Lazarus was not dead, only sleeping. He told the sisters that Lazarus would rise, to which they replied that they knew all good souls would one day rise. But Jesus tells them that all who believe in Him will never die. Jesus tells them to take away the stone from the cave that was the tomb. Jesus then cried out in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" And the dead man came out, still wrapped in the burial garb. Jesus told those assembled to unwrap him and let him loose. Many of the Jews who witnessed this began to believe in Jesus.

Sunday, April 2nd (Palm Sunday) Regular Mass schedule on Saturday (5:15) and Sunday (7:30, 9:30, 11:30)

Procession with Palms Matthew 21:1-11 - Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem accompanied by waving palms.

**First Reading from Isaiah 50:4-7** - The Lord has given Isaiah the strength to speak to those who are weary. He opens his ears to har those in need. The Lord is his help; therefore, he has no fears.

Responsorial Psalm 22:8-9, 17-18, 19-20, 23-24 - "My God, my God, why have you abandoned me?"

**Epistle Reading from Paul's Letter to the Philippians 2:6-11 -** Jesus came to us in the form of a slave, coming in human appearance. He humbled Himself, becoming obedient, even to the point of death, death on a cross. Because of this, God exalted Him and bestowed on Him the name of Jesus, at whose name, very knee on earth should bend, and tongue should profess that Jesus Christ is Lord.

Gospel of Matthew 26:14—27:66 - The reading begins with Judas making the deal with the chief priests to turn Jesus over into their possession, in exchange for thirty pieces of silver. The reading continues with Jesus telling his disciples to prepare a room since the day of the Feast of unleavened Bread (Passover) was fast approaching. During the meal, Jesus predicted that one of His apostles would betray Him. Jesus then proclaimed the words of institution, creating our sacrament of the Eucharist. Jesus predicted that Peter would betray him that very night. Jesus and His followers then went to the Garden of Gethsemane to pray. But the apostles were too tired to stay awake. Jesus prayed by Himself. When Judas arrived with a crowd with swords and clubs, they took Jesus into custody. This long Gospel continues with the trial of Jesus, the denial by Peter, the whipping of Jesus and His carrying the cross. It culminates with the crucifixion and the Seven Last Word of Jesus before he dies on the cross.



# CHALLENGE FOR MARCH

We all know the 7 **Sacraments** of the Church (Baptism, Reconciliation, Eucharist, Confirmation, Marriage, Holy Orders and Sacrament of the Sick. Each is a formal rite of the Church conferred on believers to bestow grace on the recipient. But what are **Sacramentals**?

Less ritualistic than Sacraments, **Sacramentals** are objects or events that are used to increase our prayer and devotion. **Sacramentals** are meant to remind us of the truths of the Christian faith and help us be devoted to our belief in Jesus and all things spiritual. When we use a **Sacramental**, it should help us remember that we are in service to God; and we don't have to wait until the opportunity to receive a Sacrament in order to heighten our grace and belief. Some example of **Sacramentals** that we are aware of might make it easier to understand them:

Rosaries, scapulars, crucifixes, religious medals, statues of saints and religious art such as Icons (see February's bulletin), palms, ashes (such as on Ash Wednesday), candles, holy water and holy cards. Some are not necessarily objects, such as the Sign of the Cross and blessings.

Speaking of blessings, it is common when one receives a new rosary or crucifix or religious statue, the object is taken to Father Fred or Deacon Victor for a solemn blessing. The blessing signifies the use to which the item will be put - namely, that it will be used in the service of the worship of God and to help in our prayer or devotion to the Lord.
