# **SUNDAY MASS READINGS FOR AUGUST**

#### Sunday, July 30th (Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time)

**First Reading from the First Book of Kings 3:5, 7-12 -** Solomon had a dream that the Lord offered to give Solomon any wish he made. Solomon pleased the Lord when he asked for wisdom when ruling the people so he would know right from wrong in his decisions and judgments. (Have you ever heard the metaphor of "Solomon wise?")

Responsive Psalm 119:57, 72, 76-77, 127-128, 129-130 - "Lord, I love your commands."

**Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans 8:28-30 -** All things turn out good for those who love God. For those whom God calls, they will be justified in life and glorified after life.

**Gospel of Matthew 13:44-52 -** Yet another three parables from Jesus, using metaphors for the kingdom of heaven: a treasure buried in the field, a merchant searching for fine pearls, a net thrown into the sea to catch fish. The finder of the treasure prizes it, the merchant finds a pearl of great value and buys it, and the net catches good and bad fish, which are either saved in a bucket or thrown away. This is like the angels who will separate the wicked from the good.

#### Sunday, August 6th (Transfiguration of the Lord)

**First Reading from the Book of Deuteronomy 7:9-10, 13-14** - The Ancient One was seated on the throne of heaven with flames radiating out from Him. Thousands ministered to Him. The Son of Man came through clouds in heaven and was presented to the Ancient One and received dominion, glory and kingship. All peoples and all nations served Him and His kingship shall never be destroyed.

Responsive Psalm 97:1-2, 5-6, 9 - "The Lord is king, the Most High over all the earth."

**Epistle Reading from the 2nd Letter of Peter 1:16-19** - The power of our Lord Jesus Christ is not a myth. We have been witnesses of His majestic glory. We have heard the voice of the Almighty when we were with Him on the mountain. You would do well to be attentive to the prophetic message that we preach.

**Gospel of Matthew 17:1-9** - The story of the Transfiguration of Jesus on the mountain top when His divine glory was shown to Peter, James and John. The voice from a cloud proclaimed that Jesus was the Beloved Son. Peter's memorable line: "Lord, it is good that we are here." But Jesus told him not to tell anyone what was seen.

#### Sunday, August 13th (Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time)

**First Reading from the 1st Book of Kings 19:9, 11-13 -** Elijah, the prophet, was told by God to go to the mountain and stand at the entrance of a cave, and there the Lord will pass by. Elijah witnessed a heavy wind, an earthquake and a fire. But the Lord was not there. Then Elijah heard a tiny whispering sound and hid his eyes in his cloak, for he knew it was the Lord passing by.

Responsive Psalm 85:9, 10, 11-12, 13-14 - "Lord, let us see your kindness, and grant us your salvation."

**Epistle Reading from Paul's Letter to the Romans 9:1-5** - Paul tells the people that he speaks the truth, that he bears witness through the Holy Spirit, and that he knows that Christ is over all his people and God blesses all.

Gospel of Matthew 14:22-33 - Jesus and His disciples went across the lake and Jesus went up to a high mountain to pray by himself. The Apostles got back in the boat which was a few miles offshore when the wind and waves began to pummel the boat. Jesus set off, walking on the water, and the Apostles were fearful when they saw Him approach. But Jesus told them not to be afraid. Peter said to Jesus that if He commanded him to walk to Him on the water, that he would. Peter got out of the boat but was fearful of the water and wind and began to sink, crying out for the Lord to save him, which Jesus did, admonishing Peter for having so little faith.

#### Sunday, August 20th (Twentieth Sunday in Ordinary Time)

**First Reading from the Book of Isaiah 56:1, 6-7** - The Lord commands all to do what is right and just, to minister to the Lord and love the name of the Lord and follow His commandments and worship in the house of prayer.

Responsive Psalm 67:2-3, 5, 6, 8 - "O God, let all the nations praise you!"

**Epistle Reading from Paul's Letter to the Romans 11:13-15, 29-32 -** Paul speaks to the Gentiles as the apostle to the Gentiles. He glories in being able to preach to non-Jews. He has received the call of God and the Gifts of God. The people who hear the Word and believe will receive mercy.

**Gospel of Matthew 15:21-28** - A Canaanite woman pleaded with Jesus to heal her daughter who was tormented by a demon. The woman persisted even when the Apostles tormented her. Finally Jesus praised the woman because of her great faith. And her daughter was healed at that very moment.

#### Sunday, August 27th (Twenty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time)

**First Reading from the Book of Isaiah 22:19-23 -** The Lord rebuked the master of the palace and told him that He would remove him from his station and replace him with Eliakim. Elaikim will have authority and become the patriarch to the inhabitants of Jerusalem. He shall be given the key to the House of David and shall be honored in his family.

Responsive Psalm 138:1-2, 2-3, 6, 8 - "Lord, your love is eternal; do not forsake the work of your hands."

**Epistle Reading from Paul's Letter to the Romans 11:33-36** - How unsearchable are the ways of God and how deep are the riches of His wisdom and knowledge! All things are from Him and through Him. To Him be glory forever.

**Gospel of Matthew 16:13-20 -** Jesus asks His disciples who people say that He is. John the Baptist? Elijah? Jeremiah? A prophet? When Peter was asked who <u>he</u> says Jesus is, Peter replies "The Christ, the Son of God." Jesus commends Peter for his insight and tells Peter (whose name *Petrus* means "rock" in Latin) that upon Peter, the rock, Jesus will build His Church and nothing shall prevail against it. Peter is given the keys to the kingdom of heaven.

#### Sunday, September 3rd (Twenty-second Sunday in Ordinary Time)

**First Reading from the Book of Jeremiah 20:7-9 -** Jeremiah feels self-pity for speaking about the Lord, at which, the people laughed and mocked him. The word of the Lord has brought Jeremiah derision and reproach, but still, he feels the need to continue speaking the name of the Lord for he cannot endure holding it within himself.


Responsive Psalm 63:2, 3-4, 5-6, 8-9 - "My soul is thirsting for you, O Lord my God."

**Epistle Reading from Paul's Letter to the Romans 12:1-2 -** Paul urges the people to offer their bodies as a living sacrifice, which is holy and pleasing to God. Do not give in to the evils of the times. Renew your mind. Discern the will of God. Do what is good and pleasing and perfect.

**Gospel of Matthew 16:21-27 -** Jesus alerts His disciples that He must go to Jerusalem, where He will suffer at the hands of the religious leaders and then be killed. When Peter tried to persuade Jesus not to go to Jerusalem, Jesus chided Peter as an obstacle, telling Peter not to think as humans do, but to think as God does. Jesus warned all of the disciples that anyone who wants to follow Him must deny himself and take up his own cross. In the end, people will be repaid according to their conduct.

# HOLY FAMILY CATHOLIC CHURCH CHALLENGE FOR AUGUST

The Transfiguration of the Lord (August 6th) and the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary (August 15th) are the two celebrated during this month. The other, the Feast of the Immaculate Conception of Mary, is not an August observance, but will be celebrated later this year on December 8th. Before highlighting the other two, please remember that the Immaculate Conception of Mary is sometimes confused with the Annunciation to Mary by the Angel Gabriel and the Conception of Jesus. This is an unofficial feast day, held nine months (March 25) before the date that we ascribe to the Birth of Jesus on December 25th. The Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary, (December 8th) on the other hand, celebrates our faithful belief that Mary was conceived without sin in anticipation of her becoming the Mother of Jesus. But back to the other two August feast days:

The Gospel reading for the weekend of August 5/6 will be Matthew's version of the Transfiguration of Jesus on a high mountain as witnessed by Peter, James and John. The event is also conveyed in the Gospels of Mark and Luke and is also alluded to by Peter in one of his Letters (2 Peter 1:16-21) See page 3 of this bulletin for an account of this event.

The Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary (a Holy Day celebrated each year on August 15) commemorates the death of Mary and her being



taken up to heaven both body and soul. This too is part of our faithful belief; it was validated as a doctrine of the Church by Pope Pius XII who declared in 1950, using his authority of papal infallibility, "that the Immaculate Mother of God, having completed the course of her earthly life was assumed body and soul into heavenly glory," being welcomed by the angelic presence of the heavenly hosts.
