* LENTEN FAST AND ABSTAINING *

As noted on page 7 in explaining Lent, Catholics use Lent as a time to pray and sacrifice in an effort to improve their steadfast faith. As part of this sacrifice, we are called to experience fasting and abstaining according to Church guidelines. **Fast:** On **Ash Wednesday** and **Good Friday**, Catholics age 18 to 59 limit the amount of food they eat to one full meal in order to sacrifice in remembrance of Christ and his fasting while in the desert. Pregnant women and those who need regular meals for medical reasons are exempt from this fasting. **Abstain:** On each **Friday** during Lent (including **Good Friday**) plus **Ash Wednesday**, Catholics 14 and older refrain from eating meat (beef, pork, chicken, turkey, but any fish product is OK). Again, any medical conditions would preclude a person's abstention from meat. Be sure to include your intentional fasting and abstaining as part of your prayer regimen during Lent.

SUNDAY MASS READINGS FOR FEBRUARY

Sunday, January 28th (Fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time)

First Reading from the Book of Deuteronomy 18:15-20 - Moses tells the people that God will raise up a prophet from among them whom they should listen to for God will put His words in the mouth of the prophet. Anyone who does not listen to God's words will have to answer to it. Anyone who speaks in the name of other gods will die.

Responsive Psalm 95:1-2, 6-7, 7-9 - "If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians 7:32-35 - Paul tells the people of Corinth that they should avoid all anxieties. Married or unmarried men and married or unmarried women all exhibit anxieties. Paul says that, for their own sakes, they all should be restrained and adhere to the Lord without distraction.

Gospel of Mark 1:21-28 - Jesus and his disciples went to Capernaum on the Sabbath and Jesus taught in the synagogue. The people were amazed that Jesus taught with authority, not as the Scribes taught. In the synagogue was a man possessed by an unclean spirit who rebuked Jesus for having come to destroy the people. The spirit within the man called out to Jesus in anger. Jesus told the spirit to come out of the man, which happened immediately. The people were amazed that Jesus commanded the unclean spirit who obeyed Him. And Jesus' fame spread throughout the region of Galilee.

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Sunday, February 4th (Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time)

First Reading from Job 7:1-4, 6-7 - Job laments about the drudgery of life and the misery that has been allotted to him. To him, life is without hope and he exclaims that he will never see happiness again.

Responsive Psalm 147:1-2, 3-4, 5-6 - "Praise the Lord, who heals the brokenhearted."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians 9:16-19, 22-23 - Paul says that woe will befall him if he does not preach the Gospel. He teaches the Good News freely, becoming weak to help heal the weak. He says he teaches the Gospel so that he may have a share in that same Gospel message.

Gospel of Mark 1:29-39 - Jesus goes to the house of Simon (Peter) and Andrew and heals the mother-in-law of Simon who was ill with a fever. At night, many people came to Him and he healed them of their various diseases, and drove out demons who possessed some of them. The next day Jesus went into nearby villages and preached in their synagogues and drove out more devils throughout Galilee.

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Sunday, February 11th (Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time)

First Reading from the Book of Leviticus 13:1-2, 44-46 - The Lord spoke to Moses and Aaron and prescribed how those with scabs or blotches or sores of leprosy should be declared unclean and when walking should cry out "Unclean." Those with the disease should live outside their camp as long as they were unclean.

Responsive Psalm 32:1-2, 5, 11 - "I turn to you, Lord, in time of trouble, and you fill me with the joy of salvation."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians 10:31-11:1 - Paul exhorted the people to do everything they did for the glory of God. They should not offend Jew or Greek. They should be imitators of Paul, just as Paul is an imitator of Christ.

Gospel of Mark 1:40-45 - A leper went to Jesus, knelt down and begged Jesus to cure him, which Jesus did by simply touching him. The man was made clean immediately. Jesus warned the man to tell no one anything but to go directly to the high priest, show himself as clean and be freed of the scourge of the disease. The man did that but also spread the word far and wide that Jesus had cured him, which forced Jesus to go into a deserted area because people kept trying to find him to ask for more cures.




Sunday, February 18th (First Sunday of Lent)

First Reading from the Book of Genesis 9:8-15 - God establishes a covenant with Noah and his sons promising that the world will never again be destroyed by flood waters; and that no humans nor other living creatures will ever be consumed by water. God's promise is accompanied by the sign of a rainbow in the clouds.

Responsive Psalm 25:4-5, 6-7, 8-9 - "Your ways, O Lord, are love and truth to those who keep your covenant."

Epistle Reading from the First Letter of Peter 3:18-22 - Christ suffered for sins that He might lead the unrighteous to God. Though Christ was put to death, He was brought back to life by the Spirit. The readers are reminded about Noah and the other few who were saved on the ark as a prefiguring of baptism in Christ.

Gospel of Mark 1:12-15 - Mark's version of Jesus remaining in the desert for forty days, living among the wild beasts, being tempted by the devil, and being ministered to by the angels. Upon returning to Galilee, Jesus proclaimed the Gospel of God, telling the people that they must repent for the kingdom of God is at hand.



Sunday, February 25th (Second Sunday of Lent)

First Reading from the Book Genesis 22:1-2, 9, 10-13, 15-18 - God puts Abraham to the test by ordering him to take his son Isaac and offer him as a holocaust to God. Abraham is willing to sacrifice his son if that is God's will. Abraham built an altar, put wood on it and was prepared to slaughter his son. But, God stopped Abraham and told him not to harm the boy. God saw how devoted Abraham was and provided a ram instead for the burnt offering. The Lord told Abraham that, because of his devotion to God, Abraham would be made the father of Israel and his descendants would be as numerous as the stars in the sky. All of this because he obeyed God's command.

Responsive Psalm 116:10, 15, 16-17, 18-19 - "I will walk before the Lord, in the land of the living."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans 8:31-34 - If God is for us, who can be against us? If God handed over His Son on our behalf, He will give us everything we need. If God acquits us, who can condemn us? Jesus who was raised and now sits at the right hand of God will intercede for us.

Gospel of Mark 9:2-10 - Mark's version of the Transfiguration of Jesus on the mountain top in the presence of Peter, James and John. Jesus' clothes became dazzling white and Moses and Elijah appeared with them on the mountain. A voice from the clouds above them said that "This is my beloved Son. Listen to Him." The disciples were terrified at what was happening. On the way down the mountain, Jesus told them not to tell anyone what they experienced.

GRACE

In Father Fred’s *Pastor’s Corner* in the January Bulletin, he mentioned that 2024 would be a “Year of **Grace**” as declared by the Vatican. To introduce this concept, Pope Francis began the new year by urging his fellow Catholics to entrust 2024 to the Mother of God, who “knows our needs” and always intercedes to “make **grace** overflow in our lives.”

Throughout his sermon, the Pope reflected on Mary’s significance as the Mother of God, a title first attributed to the Blessed Mother at the Council of Ephesus in 431 AD in order to underscore the divinity of Christ. Through our devotion to her, we receive from Jesus the **grace** we need during the year of 2024.

But what is “grace?” The website *Bible Study Tools* points out six types of grace ==>

1. God’s Salvation Grace: God is willing to forgive ours sins and welcome us into heaven.
2. God’s Numerous Grace: If we believe in Jesus, those sins are forgiven any number of times by the grace of God.
3. God’s Forgiveness Grace: When our own sins are forgiven, it gives us the insight to forgive the faults and sins of others against us.
4. God’s New Grace: Every new day, hour, and breath is a chance for us to act better and display more of the fruits of the Spirit toward others.
5. God’s Freedom Grace: We are given the freedom by God to be faithful to our Creator who continually loves us.
6. God’s Future Grace: The future is easier to face when you have a hand to hold. That’s grace—the feeling that we’re never alone.



When a music conductor calls out “Lento!” the meaning is for the orchestra to slow down (taken from the Latin *lentus* meaning slow). When I have lent someone something, I’m using the past participle of to lend. When the Church calendar talks about Lent (taken from the Middle English *lente* meaning “spring”), it refers to the 40 day period from Ash Wednesday to Good Friday and then Holy Saturday. The three different terms have no connection to one another - and we’ll concentrate only on the third: the time period in the “spring” that the Church refers to as **Lent**.

This year, Lent will be from February 14th (Ash Wednesday) through March 30th (Holy Saturday). The 40 days - non including Sundays - of Lent commemorate the 40 days that Jesus spent fasting and praying in the desert, enduring temptations by Satan at the end of that period. All of this is recorded in the Gospels of Matthew, Mark and Luke. Spend some time during Lent and read the bible passages about these 40 days.

During our Lenten time this year, we are asked to fast and abstain from meat according to the proscriptions noted on the cover of this bulletin.

We are also encouraged to sacrifice something during Lent for the purpose of remembering the sacrifices Jesus made for all of humanity during His time on earth. Some people sacrifice by giving up some luxury in the name of Jesus (such as movies, chocolate, beer, soda, pizza, gossip, lattes, etc.). This only has grace-filling value if you are aware of the item you are giving up and include the sacrifice as part of your daily prayer. It’s like a New Year’s Resolution, only a Lenten Church Resolution!



Rather than give something up for Lent, some people choose to add something into their life that provides a grace-filling opportunity. This might include committing to better recycling efforts during Lent, volunteering at church or some community project, spending more quality time with your spouse or children, taking on neglected chores, doing more spiritual reading or more praying, and so on. Again, for any of these to be significant, they should be done intentionally with a spiritual intention about them.
