CHALLENGE FOR MARCH

With Good Friday approaching, we are reminded of the Stations of the Cross which commemorate the path Jesus was forced to take on the way from Pilate's Praetorium to Calvary. This route along the *Via Dolorosa* (or Way of Sorrows) in Jerusalem is recorded in all four Gospels: Matthew 27:27-55; Mark 15:1-41; Luke 23:1-49; and John 19:1-36. Lots of questions can be asked about the Stations of the Cross such as how many times did Jesus fall on the path under the weight of the cross and what was the name of the woman who wiped the face of Jesus with her veil? While you're looking up the answers in the Gospel passages above, see page 7 for the solution to this month's challenge.

* LENTEN FAST AND ABSTAINING *

Catholics continue to use Lent as a time to pray and sacrifice in an effort to improve their steadfast faith. As part of this sacrifice, we are called to experience fasting and abstaining according to Church guidelines. <u>Fast</u>: On **Good Friday**, Catholics age 18 to 59 limit the amount of food they eat to one full meal in order to sacrifice in remembrance of Christ having fasted while in the desert. Pregnant women and those who need regular meals for medical reasons are exempt from this fasting. <u>Abstain</u>: On each **Friday** during Lent (including **Good Friday**) Catholics 14 and older refrain from eating meat (beef, pork, chicken, turkey, but any fish product is OK). Again, any medical conditions would preclude a person's abstention from meat. Be sure to include your intentional fasting and abstaining as part of your prayer regimen during Lent.

SUNDAY MASS READINGS FOR MARCH

Sunday, February 25th (Second Sunday of Lent)

First Reading from the Book Genesis 22:1-2, 9, 10-13, 15-18 - God puts Abraham to the test by ordering him to take his son Isaac and offer him as a holocaust to God. Abraham is willing to sacrifice his son if that is God's will. Abraham built an altar, put wood on it and was prepared to slaughter his son. But, God stopped Abraham and told him not to harm the boy. God saw how devoted Abraham was and provided a ram instead for the burnt offering. The Lord told Abraham that, because of his devotion to God, Abraham would be made the father of Israel and his descendants would be as numerous as the stars in the sky. All of this because he obeyed God's command.

Responsive Psalm 116:10, 15, 16-17, 18-19 - "I will walk before the Lord, in the land of the living."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans 8:31-34 - If God is for us, who can be against us? If God handed over His Son on our behalf, He will give us everything we need. If God acquits us, who can condemn us? Jesus who was raised and now sits at the right hand of God will intercede for us.

Gospel of Mark 9:2-10 - Mark's version of the Transfiguration of Jesus on the mountain top in the presence of Peter, James and John. Jesus' clothes became dazzling white and Moses and Elijah appeared with them on the mountain. A voice from the clouds above them said that "This is my beloved Son. Listen to Him." The disciples were terrified at what was happening. On the way down the mountain, Jesus told them not to tell anyone what they experienced.

Sunday, March 3rd (Third Sunday of Lent)

First Reading from Exodus 17:3-7 - When the people grumbled to Moses that they were thirsty on their extended journey, the Lord instructed Moses to take his staff and strike a nearby rock and water began to flow from it.

Responsive Psalm 95:1-2, 6-7, 8-9 - "If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans 5:1-2, 5-8 - We have peace with God through the Lord, Jesus Christ. And we have the love of God given to our hearts through the Holy Spirit. That love of God is proven to us in that while we are sinners, Christ died for us.

Gospel of John 4:5-42 - Jesus was in a town in the region of Samaria [remember that the Jews shunned the Samaritans]. Jesus sat down at a well and a Samaritan woman came to draw out water. Jesus asked her for a drink. When the woman seemed to object, Jesus said to her that He could give her living water - that whoever drank from the well would soon be thirsty again, but anyone who drank the living water that He gives will never thirst. When Jesus told her to get her husband, she replied that she did not have a husband and Jesus prophesied that she had had five husbands. She exclaimed that she was waiting for the coming of the Messiah, and Jesus said that "He was the one." She went into town and told the people to come to the well and see the Lord.

Sunday, March 10th (Fourth Sunday in Lent)

First Reading from the 2nd Book of Chronicles 36:14-16, 19-23 - All in Judah were unfaithful and defiling the Lord's temple. God sent messengers to the people to tell them to repent, but the people mocked the messengers. Their enemies tore down the walls of Jerusalem and took the people captive to Babylon. Cyrus, King of Persia, after a revelation from the Lord, sent the people back to Judah to re-build the city of Jerusalem.

Responsive Psalm 137:1-6 - "Let my tongue be silenced, if I ever forget you!"

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Ephesians 2:4-10 - God, in the richness of His mercy - even though we had transgressions - brought us to live with Christ. By His grace, we have been saved through faith.

Gospel of John 3:14-21 - While Jesus was speaking to Nicodemus, he uttered the commonly repeated phrase [John 3:16]: "For God so love the world that He gave His only Son so that everyone who believes in Him might not perish, but might have eternal live." Whoever lives in truth believes in the light of Christ.

Sunday, March 17th (Fifth Sunday in Lent)

First Reading from the Book of the Prophet Jeremiah 31:31-34 - A foretelling that the days are coming when the Lord will make a new covenant with Israel, since they had broken the prior covenant God had made with the people in Egypt. God will be their God and they will be His people. All shall know God, says the Lord.

Responsive Psalm 51:3-4, 12-13, 14-15 - "Create a clean heart in me, O God."

Epistle Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews 5:7-9 - Jesus suffered but learned obedience. When He was made perfect through His resurrection, He became the source off salvation for all who obey Him.

Gospel of John 12:20-33 - Jesus foresaw what was to come for Him, that He was soon to be glorified. He uttered the famous saying to His apostles: "Unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit." At that, a voice from heaven spoke out and glorified Jesus.

Sunday, March 24th (Palm Sunday)

A Reading from the Book of Mark [11:1-10] during the Procession with Palms - Jesus sends His apostles into Jerusalem to prepare His way. He rides into the city to cheers and waiving of palm fronds by the people.

A reading from the Book of Isaiah 50:4-7 - Isaiah declares that the Lord his given him a tongue to proclaim the goodness of the Lord and an ear to hear the Lord's command. God is his help and he won't be disgraced.

Responsive Psalm 22:8-9, 17-20, 23-24 - "My God, my God, why have you abandoned me?"

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Philippians 2:6-11 - Jesus took the form of a slave in human likeness and humbled Himself by being put to death on the cross. God exalted Him. At the sound of His name, every knee should bend on earth and in heaven and every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord.

Gospel of Mark 14:1–15:47 - The extended Gospel story of Jesus prior to celebrating the Feast of Passover (at the Last Supper), the events in the Upper Room, the words of Institution of the Eucharist, the praying in the Garden of Gethsemane, the arrest of Jesus, the trial by the high priest, the denial by Peter, the sentencing to death by Pilate, the release of Barabbas, the Way of the Cross up to Golgotha, the Crucifixion, the words of Jesus on the cross, the death of Jesus, and the laying of the body in the tomb.

Sunday, March 31st (Easter Sunday)

First Reading from the Acts of the Apostles 10:34, 37-43 - Peter proclaimed that he and the other apostles were all witnesses of what Jesus did throughout His public ministry, and that he had been commissioned to preach the Good News to all the people so that everyone who believes in Jesus will received forgiveness of sins.

Responsive Psalm 118:1-2, 16-17, 22-23 - "This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Colossians 3:1-4 - As we all were raised with Christ, we should seek what is above, not what is on earth. We will appear with Christ in all His glory.

Gospel of John 20:1-9 - The story of Mary of Magdala going to the tub early in the morning and saw the stone removed from the tomb. She went in haste to find Peter and the apostle John, fearful that someone had taken Jesus' body from the tomb. When the three went back to the time, they looked in and saw the burial clothes set aside and the tomb otherwise empty. They did not fully understand that He had to rise, but they saw with their own eyes and believed.

HOLY FAMILY CATHOLIC CHURCH CHALLENGE FOR MARCH

For devout pilgrims throughout the world who could never travel to the Holy Lands to walk the Via Crucis (Way of the Cross) in person, the Church started to build progressive shrines along paths surrounding churches and basilicas that a pilgrim could walk, stopping at each memorial or station to meditate and pray about what Jesus was experiencing at that point on His walk to Calvary. Throughout the Middle Ages, more and more stopping points or devotionals were added for pilgrims to contemplate the sorrows along the Way. At one point, it was estimated that there were more than 35 such Stations, many of them representing apocryphal stories brought about by legends. So in 1731, Pope Clement XII fixed the number of Stations at 14, and you can see and visit those 14 right in our own sanctuary at Holy Family. The icons are on our walls, progressing from the left front with Station 1 along the walls to the rear and then forward on the right side, ending at Station 14.

Back to our challenge on the cover of the bulletin, how many times did Jesus fall under the weight of the cross? What was the name of the woman with the veil? And where did Jesus meet His mother along the Via Dolorosa? The answers to all of these questions is a big "duh?" None of those 5 stations are recorded in any of the Gospels! There are no scriptural references to Jesus falling or of a person named Veronica; and Mary is not mentioned along the Way, but only at the foot of the cross. These are myths or customary stories, added by oral tradition in telling the story of Jesus' saga (similar to the apocryphal additions put into the Nativity story that were actually myths and not part of the true Gospel stories of the birth of Jesus).

With this in mind, Pope John Paul II introduced a new version of the Stations, all of which <u>are</u> scripturally based. On Good Friday of 1991, JP II carried an actual cross on his back around the Coliseum in Rome, stopping at these 14 devotional sites that represented actual events from the scriptures. Here are the "new" 14 Scriptural Stations of the Cross, all found in one or more of the Gospels::

- 1. Jesus prays at Gethsemane
- 2. Jesus, betrayed by Judes, is arrested
- 3. Jesus is condemned by the Sanhedrin
- 4. Jesus is denied by Peter
- 5. Jesus is judged by Pilate
- 6. Jesus is scourged and crowned with thorns
- 7. Jesus carries the cross
- 8. Jesus is helped by Simon of Cyrene
- 9. Jesus meets the women of Jerusalem
- 10. Jesus is crucified
- 11. Jesus promises Paradise to the good thief
- 12. Jesus speaks to His mother from the cross
- 13. Jesus dies on the cross
- 14. Jesus' body is laid in the tomb

Some "new" Stations of the Cross also add:

15. The women find the tomb empty
