SUNDAY MASS READINGS FOR OCTOBER

Page 3

Sunday, September 29th (Twenty-sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Book of Numbers 11:25-29 - The Lord came down from the clouds and spoke to Moses and brought the spirit on the elders of the people who then each prophesied. Two of the men, Eldad and Mead, were not originally with the others, but they too were given the Spirit and began to prophesy. The others demanded that Moses stop these two from prophesying but Moses accused the others of being envious that the Lord's Spirit also rested on them. Moses rejoiced that the Lord bestowed the Spirit on them as well.

Responsive Psalm 19:8,10, 12-13, 14 - "The precepts of the Lord give joy to the heart."

Epistle Reading from the Letter of James 5:1-6 - James tells those who are rich and flaunt their wealth that their riches will pass away. Their clothes will rot away and their wealth will ruin them. If they withhold wages from their workers, the workers wailing will be heard by the Lord and they will will be upheld by the Lord.

Gospel of Mark 9:38-43, 45, 47-49 - The disciple John complained to Jesus that someone who was not from their group was driving out demons in the name of Jesus. Jesus said that anyone who performs deeds in His name will never speak ill of Him. Anyone who is not against them is for them and will be rewarded. On the other hand, anyone who sins or causes someone else to sin should be thrown into the sea.

Sunday, October 6th (Twenty-seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Book of Genesis 2:18-24 - The story of the creation by God of woman and all animals of the earth, sea and air.

Responsive Psalm 128: 1-6 - " May the Lord bless us all the days of our lives."

Epistle Reading from Hebrews 2:9-11 - For awhile, humanity was made lower than the angels, having to taste death. But many children have been brought forth into glory and are given salvation through their suffering. None of them are ashamed to call one another "brothers."

Gospel of Mark 10:2-16 - Jesus updates the Law of Moses the allowed a man and woman to write a decree of divorce. Jesus says that a man and woman are joined together by God an should not be separated. While Jesus was teaching this, people were taking children to be touched by Jesus but the disciples discouraged this. Jesus, on the other hand, said to bring the children to Him wherein he embraced and blessed them, saying that the people should accept the Kingdom of God like a child.

Sunday, October 13th (Twenty-eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Book of Wisdom 7:7-11 - The writer prayed that wisdom would be given to them and it was. Wisdom should be preferred to riches and health and this wisdom never yields to temptation.

Responsive Psalm 90:12-17 - " Fill us with your love, O Lord, and we will sing for joy!"

Epistle Reading from Hebrews 4:12-13 - The Word of God is alive and more powerful than the sword. The Word of God penetrates soul and spirit and body and heart.

Gospel of Mark 10:17-39 - A man approached Jesus and asked Him what he needed to do to inherit eternal life. Jesus told him to obey all of the Commandments. The man said that he had done all of this, but Jesus told him that he was still lacking one thing: he should sell what he had and give to the poor; then, he will have treasure in heaven. At that, the man went away sad for he had many possessions. Jesus told Hs disciples that it is hard for a wealthy person to enter the kingdom of heaven, but nothing is impossible for God. I've and do for others.

Sunday, October 20th (Twenty-ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Book of Isaiah 53:10-11 - If the Lord's servant gives his life as an offering for sin, his descendants will live a long life and the will of the Lord shall be accomplished.

Responsive Psalm 33:4-5, 18-19, 20, 22 - "Lord, let your mercy be on us, as we place our trust in you."

Epistle Reading from Hebrews 4:14-16 - Jesus is our high priest who has passed through the heavens on our behalf. He is able to sympathize our weaknesses and was tested in every way without succumbing to sin.

Gospel of Mark 10:35-45 - Apostles James and John asked a favor of Jesus: that they be allowed to sit at His side in heaven. Jesus told them that this favor was not His to be able to grant but is reserved for the will of God. The other apostles were upset with James and John for asking what they did, and Jesus reminded all of them that He did not come to be served, but to serve others and give His life as a ransom for all.

Sunday, October 27th (Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Book of Jeremiah 31:7-9 - Jeremiah reminds the people that the Lord delivered His people by bringing them back from exile and gathering them from the ends of the earth. The people left their homeland in tears but were returned by being guided and consoled by God who is the Father to Israel.

Responsive Psalm 126:1-6 - "The Lord has done great things for us; we are filled with joy."

Epistle Reading from Hebrews 5:1-6 - Every high priest is taken from among the people to represent the people before God by offering sacrifices and gifts to atone for everyone's sins. The priests were called by God Himself.

Gospel of Mark 10:46-52 - As Jesus and his disciples were walking along the road, a blind man, Bartimaeus, called out to Jesus to have pity on him in his blindness. The crowd told Bartimaeus to be silent but he kept yelling louder. Jesus told his disciples to bring the man to Him and Jesus asked him what he wanted. Bartimaeus replied that he wanted to see. Jesus told him that his faith had saved him and immediately he received his sight back.

Sunday, November 3rd (Thirty-first Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Book of Deuteronomy 6:2-6 - Moses told the people to keep all the statutes and commandments of God. In that way, they can prosper more and be led to the Promised Land. They must love the Lord with all their heart, all their soul, and all their strength.

Responsive Psalm 18:2-4, 47, 51 - "I love you, Lord, my strength."

Epistle Reading from Hebrews 7:23-28 - The priests of the people could not remain in office due to all people being susceptible to death. Jesus, on the other hand, remains forever. His priesthood does not pass away. Jesus is able to save those who approach God through Him. His intercession lasts forever.

Gospel of Mark 12:28-34 - One of the Scribes wanted to challenge Jesus and asked Him which is the greatest of all the commandments. Jesus replied that the first is to love God with all you heart and soul and mind and strength. And the second is to love your neighbor as yourself. There are no commandments greater than these. When the Scribe showed understanding with the response, Jesus said to him that he is not far from the kingdom of God. And the others were afraid to ask Him any more questions.

HOLY FAMILY CATHOLIC CHURCH CHALLENGE FOR OCTOBER

A number of words that are part of our worship prayers and responses at Mass are actually words taken directly from other languages (Latin, Greek and Hebrew). For instance:

- † Amen is in fact from ecclesiastical Latin (āmēn) meaning "so be it" or "let it be."
- † *Eleison* is a Greek word (ελέησον) meaning "have mercy" as in *Kyrie eleison* and *Christi eleison*.
- † Alleluia is a Hebrew word (hallelu-jah) meaning "praise ye, Lord" as in the Gospel acclamation
- † Hosannah, is another Hebrew word (hoshi'ahna) meaning literally "save, we pray") as in the Holy, Holy, Holy prayer Hosannah in the highest
