ORDINARY TIME

As you check pages 3 and 4 to see the Lectionary for Sunday readings this month, you will notice that we are back into what the Church calls the Sundays in Ordinary Time. Does that mean that the readings for those Sundays are all ordinary, plain, unremarkable, and just commonplace? No, not really; read on:

In religious parlance, the term "Ordinary" comes from the Latin root *ordo* meaning "order, row, rank, series, or arrangement." Thus, **Ordinary Time** in the liturgical sense refers to the order of Sundays throughout the year that are in a sequence or order from the First Sunday in Ordinary Time (January 12) to the Thirty-third Sunday in Ordinary Time (November 16). Spaced within these Sundays are other Sundays that interrupt the numbering sequence and provide a different series of important Sundays such as those Sundays in Lent, in Eastertide, Pentecost, Advent and Christmastide that we encounter within the sequence of the numbered Sundays. There is even a book published by the United States Bishops' Conference call the "Ordo" that gives priests and deacons the "order" of daily prayers, feast days and Masses during an entire year.

SUNDAY MASS READINGS FOR FEBRUARY

Sunday, January 26th (The Third Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from Nehemiah 8:2-6, 8-10: Ezra, the priest and prophet, read from the scroll of the law to all the people assembled from morning to night. When the people heard God's word proclaimed, they bowed down and accepted the word of God to be their strength.

Responsive Psalm 19:8, 9, 10, 15: "Your words, Lord, are Spirit and life."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians 12:12-30: A body has many parts but remains as one body. So too, Paul says, is Christ - there are many parts of His Kingdom but all remain one Kingdom. We are each separate, but we remain pat of the one body of Christ whether Jew or Greek, slave or free. All parts of the body should be treated with respect regardless of the gifts afforded to each body.

Gospel of Luke 1:1-4; 4:14-21: Luke tells the reason that he set out to write down the story of Jesus as he experienced it. Luke tells of Jesus going to the synagogue on the sabbath and reading from the scroll of the prophet Isaiah, and then interpreting the writings for all who were listening. The portion of Isaiah that He read included the need to bring glad tidings to the poor, liberty to the captives, sight to the blind and proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord.

Sunday, February 2nd (Presentation of the Lord)

A reading from Malachi 3:1-4: The Lord tells Malachi that He will be sending a messenger to prepare for His coming (prefiguring John the Baptist).

Responsive Psalm 24:7-10: "Who is this King of Glory? It is the Lord!"

Epistle Reading from Hebrews 2:14-18: Jesus was like a brother or sister to all in that, by His death, He destroyed the power of death which is the Devil. And He became a high priest before God and forgave the sins of the people. Since He was tested by His suffering, He was able to help all those who also were being tested.

Gospel of Luke 2:22-40: The story of Mary and Joseph taking Jesus to the temple in Jerusalem to present Him to God. They encounter the holy man Simeon who recognizes Jesus as the hoped-for Messiah. And they encounter the prophetess Anna at the temple who declared that Jesus would redeem all of Jerusalem.

Sunday, February 9th (Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from Isaiah 6:1-2, 3-8: Isaiah's vision of seeing the Lord on a high throne, surrounded by Seraphim (see pg. 7) praising the Lord of Hosts. An Angel approached Isaiah, touched his lips with a glowing ember, declaring that his wickedness was removed and his sins purged. Isaiah told the Lord: "Here I am; send me!"

Responsive Psalm 138:1-5, 7-8: "In the sight of the angels I will sing your praises, Lord."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians 15:1-11: Paul tells the Corinthians that if they heed the Gospel that he preaches, they will be saved. He reminds them that Christ died for their sins, was buried, rose on the third day, and appeared to many including himself, and that the grace of God is within them all.

Gospel of Luke 5:1-11: The story of Jesus at Lake Gennesaret. He gets into a boat belonging to Simon (Peter) and tells Simon to cast off a short way. From there, Jesus preached to the crowds along the shoreline. He then tells Peter to go farther out into the lake and lower his nets. Simon initially tells Jesus that would be futile as they had fished all night and caught nothing. Simon goes out anyway, lowers his nets, and catches a huge number of fish - so many that they had to call for another boat to take in the catch. Those on the two boats (Simon, James and John) came back to shore praising the Lord, leaving their boats, and began to follow Jesus.

Sunday, February 16th (Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Prophet Jeremiah 17:5-8: We should all trust in the Lord and hope in the Lord. We are like trees planted near water: our roots stretch out to receive nourishment, and even when the heat bears down, we would still bear fruit. But if we trust only in humans, we are like a tree in the barren desert with no viable roots.

Responsive Psalm 1:1-4, 5: "Blessed are they who hope in the Lord."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians 15:12, 16-20: If Christ was raised from the dead, then we must know that all of us will be raised from the dead. Otherwise our faith would be in vain and we should have no hope in having our sins forgiven. Without faith in the resurrection of all, we are a pitiful people.

Gospel of Luke 6:17, 20-26: This is Luke's version of the Sermon on the Mount as found in Matthew's Gospel. In this story (referred to as the Sermon on the Plain), Jesus strengthens the "Beatitudes" or the "Blessed be's . . ." He also gives the "Woes to you's . . ." that exhort people to hear His words and not continue living as they are.

Sunday, February 23rd (Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from 1 Samuel 26:2, 7-9, 12-13, 22-23: During the heated battle between Saul's soldiers and David, David snuck into Saul's camp and confiscated Saul's spear, doing no harm to Saul because he was God's anointed. The next day, David flaunted the spear to Saul's troops and told them that he, David, is merciful, as they should be too.

Responsive Psalm 103:1-4, 8, 10, 12-13: "The Lord is kind and merciful."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians 15:45-49: Humanity began with Adam, a living being. Humanity continues with one heavenly being. The first man was from the earth; the next man from heaven. But now we are all both earthly and heavenly because we bear the image of the heavenly one.

Gospel of Luke 6:27-38: This is the exhortation from Jesus to His disciples: love your enemies, give to anyone who asks, do good to everyone, stop judging and condemning, forgive others, be merciful to all, be a level above sinners. In that way, Jesus says, they will receive a great reward in heaven. What they do for others will be returned measure for measure.

Sunday, March 2 (Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Book of Sirach 27:4-7: One's faults appear when one speaks. Tribulation is the test of the just. Take care in your speech lest it discloses an ill bend of your mind.

Responsive Psalm 92:2-3, 13-16: "Lord, it is good to give thanks to You."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians 15:54-58: Sin is the sting of death. Thanks to God, we are given victory over sin and death through Jesus Christ. Always stay firm and devoted to the work of the Lord. In that way, you will know that through the Lord, your labor is not in vain.

Gospel of Luke 6:39-45: Jesus uses a number of metaphors and parables to tell his disciples how they should live: The blind should not lead another blind person. Students are not superior to their teachers but should try to become like their teachers. Do not be a hypocrite - do not accuse your brother of having a fault if you yourself have the same fault. A good tree does not bear bad fruit; nor does a rotten tree bear good fruit. An evil person produces evil while a good person produces good. Every tree is known by its own fruit.

DINNER DANCE INFO



HOLY FAMILY CATHOLIC CHURCH CHALLENGE FOR FEBRUARY

Angels are mentioned over 300 times from Genesis through the Book of Revelation in the Bible. Only a small number of angels are mentioned by name as shown below. Christian tradition and biblical scholars have separated the collective of angles into nine orders or ranks:

The highest orders are referred to as **Seraphim**, **Cherubim** and **Thrones**. These angels attend God's throne and praise God and are Angels of Peace. Check out this hymn:

Holy, holy, holy! all the saints adore thee, Casting down their golden crowns around the glassy sea. Cherubim and seraphim, falling down before thee, Who was and is and evermore shall be.

The middle orders are referred to as **Dominions**, **Virtues** and **Powers**. These angels are leaders in the heavenly realm and serve as intermediaries from God to other angels. They are in charge of miracles and provide valor against evil.

The final orders are referred to as **Principalities**, **Archangels** and **Angels**. Archangels serve as God's messengers to people (as seen in various Bible stories). Angles serve as caring assistants to humans who seek God's help. The Church teaches that each of us has been created with a Guardian Angel to care for us and watch over us.

Many angels are referenced generically in the Bible, but these six are identified by name:

- † Michael check out Jude 1:9 and the story of the battle in heaven in Revelation 12:7-9.
- † Raphael who helps Tobit and his son Tobiah as told in Tobit 12:15.
- † Gabriel In Luke 1:19 the Annunciation to Mary (also appears to Daniel and Zechariah in OT).
- † Uriel Tradition has Uriel helping Ezra in Enoch 10:1-4 (this is an Apocryphal Book not part of the canon of the Bible)
- † Lucifer familiarly know as Satan who falls from the graces of God in Revelation 12:7-9 and appears by name in the King James Version of the Bible in Isaiah 14:12.
- † Abaddon is also a fallen angel who is mentioned by name in Revelation 9:11

Non-biblical texts have created names for other angelic beings to include Ariel, Azrael, Chamuel, Haniel, Jeremiel, Jophiel, Metatron, Raguel, Raziel, Sandalphon, and Zadkiel. But these are fictional or mythical names and not recognized by the Church as bona fide.
