LENTEN FAST AND ABSTINENCE

According to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, everyone 14 years of age or older is bound to **abstain** from meat on Ash Wednesday, all the Fridays of Lent and Good Friday.

Everyone 18 or older, and under 59 years of age, is bound to **fast** on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. This means only one full meatless meal is allowed. Two other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to each one's needs, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not approved while fasting on these two days. When health or the ability to work would be seriously affected, the regulation to fast does not oblige a person.

SUNDAY MASS READINGS FOR MARCH

Sunday, March 2 (Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Book of Sirach 27:4-7: One's faults appear when one speaks. Tribulation is the test of the just. Take care in your speech lest it discloses an ill bend of your mind.

Responsive Psalm 92:2-3, 13-16: "Lord, it is good to give thanks to You."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians 15:54-58: Sin is the sting of death. Thanks to God, we are given victory over sin and death through Jesus Christ. Always stay firm and devoted to the work of the Lord. In that way, you will know that through the Lord, your labor is not in vain.

Gospel of Luke 6:39-45: Jesus uses a number of metaphors and parables to tell his disciples how they should live: The blind should not lead another blind person. Students are not superior to their teachers but should try to become like their teachers. Do not be a hypocrite - do not accuse your brother of having a fault if you yourself have the same fault. A good tree does not bear bad fruit; nor does a rotten tree bear good fruit. An evil person produces evil while a good person produces good. Every tree is known by its own fruit.

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Sunday, March 9th (First Sunday of Lent)

A reading from the Book of Deuteronomy 26:4-10: Moses told the people that when things were bleak during their wanderings, they cried out to the Lord and He heard their prayers. The Lord rescued them and led them out of Egypt to the Promised Land,

Responsive Psalm 91:1-2, 10-11, 12-13, 14-15: "Be with me, Lord, when I am in trouble."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans 10:8-13: Paul told the people that if they confess that Jesus is the Lord and believes that He was raised from the dead, then they will be saved. Whether Jew or Greek, the same Lord is Lord of all, and all will be saved.

Gospel of Luke 4:1-13: Luke's story of Jesus being led to the desert for forty days to pray and fast before He began His public ministry. The story tells of the devil's attempt three times to tempt Jesus to worship the devil. Jesus made it clear that no one should put the Lord to the test.

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Sunday, February 16th (Second Sunday in Lent)

A reading from the Book of Genesis 15:5-12, 17-18: God showed Abraham the stars in the sky and told him that his descendants would be as numerous as those stars. After Abraham made burnt offerings to God, he fell into a deep sleep and had a vision wherein God made a covenant with Abraham and gave him the Promised Land.

Responsive Psalm 27:1, 7-8, 8-9, 13-14: "The Lord is my light and my salvation."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Philippians 3:17-4:1: Paul tells the people that they should emulate him and do as he says and does. Anyone who does not follow the model of Jesus will be doomed as enemies of the Cross of Jesus. Do not be occupied with earthly things, he says, but instead, be citizens of heaven and in that way, they will stand firm in the Lord.

Gospel of Luke 9:28-36: This is Luke's version of the Transfiguration of Jesus on the Mountain. Jesus took Peter, James and John to the mountain top and His face and clothes changed appearance and became dazzling bright. Appearing there with Jesus were Moses and Elijah and the apostles were amazed. More amazingly, a voice came out of the clouds proclaiming that Jesus was His Son (as in the Son of God). And the disciples remained fearful and told no one at the time of their experience.

Sunday, March 23rd (Third Sunday of Lent)

A reading from Exodus 3:1-8, 14:3-15: While Moses was tending a flock of sheep, he was led up a mountain and there an angel of the Lord appeared within burning bush. When Moses tried to examine how the bush could be burning but was not consuming itself, the Lord Himself appeared to Moses. God told Moses that He was aware that the people were complaining of their mistreatment at the hands of the Egyptians and that He would rescue them. Moses asked what if the people did not believe Moses' account, and the Lord said to tell them that "I am who Am' sent Moses to them.

Responsive Psalm 103: 1-2, 3-4, 6-7, 8, 11: "The Lord is kind and merciful."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians 10:1-6, 10-12: Paul reminded the people how God brought their ancestors out of Egypt and fed them with food and spiritual drink. He told the people that they should trust in God and not grumble as their ancestor had done. They should stand firm in their belief.

Gospel of Luke 13:1-9: Jesus told the people that if they did not repent, they would perish as others had done. He then told them the parable of the barren fig tree that the owner of the orchard wanted to cut down. But the owner's workers convinced him to spare the tree on the promise that they would water the tree and take care of the soil. And in the way, the tree would produce good fruit in the future.

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Sunday, March 30th (Fourth Sunday of Lent)

A reading from the Book of Joshua 5:9-12: While the Israelites were in Jericho near the Promised Land, they ate the Passover meal as they had done each year prior. The next day, the manna did not appear but the Israelites were then able to eat from the yield of the land of Canaan and their ordeal was over.

Responsive Psalm 34: 2-7: "Taste and see the goodness of the Lord."

Epistle Reading from the Second Letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians 5:17-21: Paul tells the people that the old things have passed away and that new things have appeared in the form of Christ who has become a new creation. He called on the people to be ambassadors for Christ and allow God to appeal to others through them. In that way, they will be reconciled to God through Christ.

Gospel of Luke 15:1-3, 11-32: This is the parable of the Prodigal Son, spoken by Jesus to the Pharisees and Scribes who were complaining that Jesus was sharing himself with sinners. This parable appears only in Luke's Gospel. Listen well to the Gospel reading (or read these verses on your own) and you will readily remember the story and its moral. When you do, ask yourself which character seems closest to your own method of dealing with others (the father or the wayward son or the angry other son).

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CONFIRMATION CANDIDATES

50+ of our Holy Family youth (plus other additional parishioners) will be receiving the Sacrament of Confirmation the week before Easter. As part of the candidates' recent retreat day, each was challenged to write a **Haiku** poem expressing their personal faith in poetic form. You will be amazed at their creativity and their expressions of faith. A sampling of their creations may be found on pages 5 and 6. As space allows, more will be shared in next month's bulletin.

A haiku is a type of Japanese poem that always uses the same number of syllables in a three-line format:

- the first line is five syllables
- the second line is seven syllables
- the third line is five syllables

Unlike other poems, haikus usually don't rhyme.

CHALLENGE FOR MARCH

LECTOR SCHEDULES

1st reader / 2nd reader

[1] This year, Ash Wednesday does indeed fall on the first Wednesday of March (March 5th); but **NO**, it does not always fall on the first Wednesday of March. Ash Wednesday's date is based on the date for Easter Sunday, which is moveable. Ash Wednesday is always 46 days before Easter, which accounts for the 40 days of Lent plus the six Sundays in Lent. The span of possible dates for Ash Wednesday is from February 4th to March 10th, so it is rather late this year reflecting the late date for Easter (April 20th).

[2] **YES**, the day before Ash Wednesday is called "Shrove Tuesday" - and also "Fat Tuesday" or *Mardi Gras* ("Fat Tuesday" in French). The word "Shrove" is from an archaic Old English word "Shrive" meaning "confession" or "absolution." In the Middle Ages, church bells would ring on the day before Ash Wednesday to signal to Christians that they should go to church to prepare for Lent by confessing their sins and receiving absolution from a priest. The "Fat" part of "Fat Tuesday" indicated that it was the last day to gorge before people would begin abstaining from rich foods during Lent.

[3] **YES**, depending on one's age and medical condition, there are Church guidelines as to fast and abstinence regulations on Ash Wednesday. Check the cover of the bulletin for specifics.

[4] **NO**, the distribution of ashes is not limited to following a Mass on Ash Wednesday. Again, see the cover of the bulletin for appropriate times when ashes will be distributed at Holy Family.

[5] **YES** and **NO!** Ashes as we know them (in the form of a cross to remind us of the Crucifixion of Jesus) is a rather recent custom in the American Church. Other countries such as in Europe and Latin American do not have the ashes imprinted in the form of a cross, but have the ashes sprinkled over one's head. In the Middle Ages, men had them scattered over their heads while women (who typically wore scarves) would have them sprinkled on their foreheads. But back to the original question about biblical days: In the Bible, ashes were not actually rubbed on one's forehead. Instead, the custom of wearing "sackcloth and ashes" symbolizing repentance and sorrow can be found in a number of Old Testament books (Jonah 3:6 and Esther 4:1) and even New Testament books (Matthew 11:21 and Hebrews 9:13). Specifically, a person showed repentance for their sins by publicly wearing "sackcloth and ashes" and asking forgiveness from those they may have sinned against and asking for God's absolution.
