- [2] The month was name in honor of Caesar Augustus, the first Roman Emperor who ruled the Roman Empire from 27BCE through 14CE.
- [1] The Hiroshima bomb was dropped on August 6, 1945, the Nagasaki bomb was dropped on August 9, 1945, and August 14, 1945 is celebrated as V J Day those are 80 years ago this month!
- [0] As we finish our countdown to August, let us pray that there will be 0 (zero) uses of these nuclear weapons ever again in the future.

ASSUMPTION OF MARY


The Assumption of Mary is one of the four Marian dogmas of the Catholic Church (see more on this later in the article). Pope Pius XII defined it on 1 November 1950 in his apostolic constitution *Munificentissimus Deus* as the Assumption of Mary, body and soul, into heaven. (continued above right)

It leaves open the question of whether Mary died or whether she was raised to eternal life without bodily death. The New Testament is silent regarding the end of her life. In the late 4th century Epiphanius of Salamis wrote he could find no authorized tradition about how her life ended, and he identified three beliefs concerning her end: that she had a normal and peaceful death; that she died as a martyr; or that she did not die. Even more, in another text Epiphanius stated that Mary was possibly like Elijah because she never died but was assumed into heaven as he was.

The four Marian dogmas of the Church are:

- † Mary's own Immaculate Conception celebrated on December 8th each year
- † Mary's divine motherhood
- † Virgin birth of Jesus
- † The Assumption of Mary

These are all beliefs that we accept on faith. Catholicism is heavily based on our faith and beliefs about some things that cannot be proven by science but are accepted by dependence on revelation and faith such as the Trinity or the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist.

Sunday, July 27th (17th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from Genesis 18:20-32 - Abraham is confronted by the Lord about the sinfulness of the people in Sodom and Gomorrah and threatens to destroy the two cities. Abraham's response was that in destroying the evil ones in the cities, God would also sweep away the innocent along with the guilty. Abraham bargained with God that if he could find 50, 40, 30, 20, or even just 10 innocent people, would He spare the cities, and God answered that for the sake of those innocent people among the rest, He would not destroy the cities.

Responsive Psalm Psalm 138:1-2, 2-3, 6-7, 7-8 - "Lord, on the day I called for help, you answered me."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Colossians 2:12-14 - All were buried with Christ in baptism and all have been raised with Him by His Resurrection. Even when we are buried in our transgressions, we will be brought back to life and forgiven our sins because of the cross.

Gospel of Luke 11:1-13 - After Jesus was praying by Himself, His Apostles asked Him to teach them how to pray, and He gave them the words of the Lord's Prayer (the "Our Father'). Jesus then teaches them using the parable of a man who goes to a friend's house at midnight asking for bread in order to feed an unexpected guest. Will the owner of the house send him away or treat him like a friend? So too, Jesus tells them, the Father will give the Holy Spirit to those who ask. Seek and you will find - knock and the door will be opened! Whoever asks will be answered and whoever seeks will find.

Sunday, August 3rd (18th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from Ecclesiastes 1:2; 2:21-23 - Beware of living your life in vanity. Instead, live your life with wisdom, knowledge and skill. Don't let sorrow and grief rule your life.

Responsive Psalm 90:3-6, 12-14 and 17 - "If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Colossians 3:1-5, 9-11 - Think not about things of this world, but think about what is above, what is in the realm of Jesus. Put away earthy evil, immorality, impurity and greed. Do not lie to one another. Put on a new self wherein Christ is all and in all.

Gospel of Luke 12:13-21 - Jesus warns everyone to guard against greed when dealing with family and friends, for life does not consist solely of possessions. Jesus then told the parable of the rich man who built more and more barns to hold his grain. But when he was called to God, he lost his goods and failed to be rich in God's eyes.

Sunday, July 10th (19th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Book of Wisdom 18:6-9 - Ancestors had courage waiting for the salvation of the just and the destruction of their foes. They offered sacrifices and put into effect the divine institution of God's will.

Responsive Psalm 33:1, 12, 18-22 - "Blessed the people the Lord has chosen to be his own."

Epistle Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews 11:1-2, 8-19 - Abraham obeyed the orders of God and received his inheritance. He sojourned to the Promised Land and was blessed with many offsprings even though his wife Sara and he were advanced in age. Abraham was put to the test, but continued to believe in God.

Gospel of Luke 12:32-48 - Jesus told His disciples to sell their belongings and give alms to the poor, for that is the wish of God. He then told the parable of the servant who vigilantly waited for the master's return, lest a thief break into the house while he is gone. Peter wonders if the parable was meant for him or for others, and Jesus tells Peter that he is the servant who has been placed to guard the house and distribute food to the needy. Do not fall asleep thinking the master will be late in returning. Be vigilant and be prepared. He tells Peter that much will be required of those entrusted with much and moire will be expected of those who have been given more.

Sunday, August 17th (20th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from Jeremiah 38:4-6, 8-10 - The princes said to King Jedekiah that Jeremiah was demoralizing the people of the village, so the King had Jeremiah dropped down into a cistern where he sank in the mud. One court official went to the King and pleaded for Jeremiah's life because the princes were at fault and that Jeremiah was an upright man in the eyes of God. So the King had Jeremiah drawn out of the cistern before he would die.

Responsive Psalm 40:2, 3, 4, 18 - "Lord, come to my aid"

Epistle Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews 12:1-4 - We should rid ourselves of every burden and sin that still clings to us. We should keep our eyes on Jesus who endured the cross on our behalf and who now sits on His throne in heaven.

Gospel of Luke 12:49-53 - Jesus tells His disciples that He came to earth to set the world on fire, to establish division on earth and not peace. Take care not to let families be divided against themselves.

Sunday, August 24th (21st Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from Isaiah 66:18-21 - The Lord says that all nations and all peoples of every language will come to see the Lord's glory. Even those who have never heard of the Lord will learn of the Glory of God.

Responsive Psalm 117:1, 2 - "Go out to all the world and tell the Good News."

Epistle Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews 12:5-7, 11-13 - Even those whom the Lord Loves, He disciplines them and gives them trials to bear. Discipline can cause pain, but afterwards, it brings the peaceful fruits of righteousness to those who bear with it. Strengthen your weakness and make straight your path to God.

Gospel of Luke 13:22-30 - Jesus was asked whether many or just a few would be saved. Jesus told them to be strong and strive to enter through the narrow gate. Many will pound on the door but will not be let in but will be cast out into the netherworld. Jesus declares: "Some are last who will be first, and some are first who will be last."

Sunday, August 31st (22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Book of Sirach 3:17-18, 20, 28-29 - The people are warned to be humble, for those with humility will find favor with God. Those who conduct themselves with humility will be loved more than those who go around giving gifts out of pride. Be attentive to the needy and give alms to atone for sins.

Responsive Psalm 68:4-5, 6-7, 10-11 - "God, in your goodness, you have made a home for the poor."

Epistle Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews 12:18-19, 22-24 - The people are not destined to gloom and darkness nor to storms. They have been allowed to approach the City of God, the new Jerusalem, and been able to see countless angels and heavenly beings who have been enrolled in heaven. Jesus is the mediator of this new kingdom and the spirits of the just have been made perfect.

Gospel of Luke 14:1, 7-14 - While Jesus was eating at a table where people were choosing their places of honor He told them a parable: A guest who was invited to a wedding banquet placed himself at a place of honor. But the host tells him that a more distinguished guest has arrived who is to be placed at the spot of honor and he must go down to the lowest place and will be embarrassed, Jesus says instead, when you are invited, you should go and take the lowest place so that the host will come up to you and tell you to move to a higher position, and you will enjoy esteem by those around you. Jesus says that when you host a dinner, don't invite only those who are likely to repay you with a dinner of their own. Instead, invite the poor and crippled even though they may never invite you back in return. If you do this, you will be repaid by your Father in heaven at the resurrection of the truly righteous.
