




THANKSGIVING ALREADY?

OUR LADY OF THE ROSARY

As mentioned elsewhere in this bulletin, October 7th

is the Feast of Our Lady of the Rosary. Catholic News Service has reported that Pope Leo XIV is asking all Catholics to pray the Rosary each day in October for word peace. In an address on September 24th at the Vatican, Pope Leo XIV prayed for a reversal in the militarism being shown by Russia against Ukraine and by the Israeli strikes continuing to being leveled at those in Gaza. What is needed, he said, is to



"halt military advances" and "come to the negotiating table." He noted that October is always dedicated to praying the Rosary, but during this October, it is especially vital for us to keep ourselves aware of the power of prayer and the power of the Rosary.

We continue the recycling program at Holy Family to raise money for our "Building Fund." The recycling company only



Speaking of Ghana, here are some factoids about Fr. Fred's home country:

√ Ghana is on the south-west coast of Africa, bordering the Gulf of Guinea. To its west is Ivory Coast (Cote d'Ivoire), to its east is Togo and to its north is Burkina Faso.



- √ With 35 million inhabitants, Ghana is the second-most populous country in West Africa.
- √ Ghana is a melting pot of different cultures and ethnic groups, with over 80 different languages spoken throughout the country.
- √ The Republic of Ghana declared its independence from British colonial rule finally in 1957.
- $\sqrt{\,}$ Its capital city (which has a population of over 2 million people) is Accra on the southern coast.
- √ Ghana is home to Lake Volta, the largest manmade lake in the world by surface area.
- √ The Wli Waterfall, located in the Volta Region of Ghana, is the tallest waterfall in West Africa, standing at over 260 feet tall.
- $\sqrt{\ }$ Fr. Fred is from the fishing village of Shama, on the southwestern seaside of Ghana.
- $\sqrt{}$ As the crow flies, the closest U.S. state to Ghana is . . . Maine (does that surprise you?).

SUNDAY MASS READINGS FOR OCTOBER

Sunday, September 28th (26th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Prophet Amos 6:1, 4-7 - Do not be complacent by living comfortably and eating cattle from the fold. Do not sit back and just make music, drink wine to excess and anoint yourself with expensive oils. Such people will be the first to be exiled and their revelry will be done away with.

Responsive Psalm 146:7-10 - "Praise the Lord, my soul!"

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's First Letter to Timothy 6:11-16 - Be men of God. Be righteous, faithful, loving, patient and gentile. Keep the commandments without wavering. Wait for the appearance of the Lord. To Him be honor and eternal power.

Gospel of Luke 16:19-31 - Jesus told this parable to the Pharisees: A rich man dressed well and dined well each day. At the man's door lay a poor man covered with sores whose name was Lazarus. He did not have fine clothes and he would gladly have eaten the scraps from the rich man's table. Both the poor man and the rich man died. The poor one was lifted by the angels to heaven; the other was buried and went to the netherworld. This man cried up to Abraham in heaven to send Lazarus down with but a drop of water to quench his thirst. Abraham told the man, however, that on earth he had received what was luxuriant while Lazarus received nothing. But now, Lazarus is com-forted while the man is tormented. Neither man can cross to where the other is. The rich man in despair then asked Abraham to send Lazarus down to earth and warn his five brothers lest they also will be condemned to the underworld. Abraham told him that if his brothers had not bothered to listen to Moses and the prophets, then they wouldn't listen to someone who would come back from the dead.

Sunday, October 5th (27th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from Habakkuk 1:2-3; 2:2-4: The prophet pleads with God to save him from violence and destruction and misery and strife. The Lord tells him to write down his vision and there is still time for that vision to become a reality. The just person, because of his faith, will live.

Responsive Psalm Psalm 95:1-2, 6-9: "If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts."

Epistle Reading from 2 Timothy 1:6-8, 13-14: God did not give us a spirit of cowardice but rather of power and love and self control. Heed the words of Paul given in the faith and love Christ Jesus.

Gospel of Luke 17:5-10: Jesus told His disciples that all they need is faith the size of a mustard seed and they should then do what is commanded and what is expected of them.

Sunday, October 12th (28th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from 2 Kings 5:14-17: Naaman was cleansed of his leprosy and, being thankful, he returned to Elisha and proclaimed that there is no God except the one true God of Israel who cured him.

Responsive Psalm Psalm 98:1, 2-4: "The Lord has revealed to the nations His saving power.

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Second Letter to Timothy 2:8-13: Paul was chained for preaching the word of God, but he tells Timothy that the word of God cannot be chained. Salvation is possible through Christ Jesus. If we die with Him, we will live with Him. But if we deny Him, He will deny us.

Gospel of Luke 17:11-19: Along the road to Jerusalem, Jesus encountered ten lepers who begged Jesus to have pity on them. Jesus told them that they would be cured and to show themselves to the priest, which they did. But only one of the ten returned to thank Jesus for the miracle. Jesus asked where the other nine were that were also cured. Jesus told the appreciative one his faith saved him.

Sunday, October 19th (29th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from Exodus 17:8-13: Not everything in the Old Testament was sunshine and roses! There were battles between factions trying to maintain the land that God gave them. This reading is one such skirmish between the people of Israel and their arch enemy, Amalek. During the battle, Moses stood on the hill with the staff of God in his hand. As long as he kept the staff raised, the Israelites were successful in battle, but when his arms got weary and he dropped them, Amalek had the upper hand. Aaron and Hur helped Moses keep his hands raised up, and the forces of Amalek were defeated.

Responsive Psalm Psalm 121:1-8: "Our help is from the Lord, who made heaven and earth."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Second Letter to Timothy 3:14–4:2: Paul told Timothy that he should remain faithful to all that he has learned in his lifetime from the Scriptures. Scripture is inspired by God and gives wisdom that is useful for teaching and training everyone too be righteous. He tells Timothy to be persistent in his preaching whether convenient or not and to be forever patient.

Gospel of Luke 18:1-8: Jesus' message to the disciples was to pray always without becoming weary. He told a parade to illustrate this: A judge was pestered by a widow for a favorable decision, but the judge puts her aside. The widow, however, continued with great effort to demand the decision, and the judge finally relented because he grew tired of her pestering. If we continually call out to God, Jesus says that He may be slow to answer, but that He will answer our petitions and justice will be done.

Sunday, October 26th (30th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from Sirach 35:12-14, 16-18: The prophet says that the Lord is a God of Justice and shows no partiality. He hears the cries of the poor, the oppressed, the orphan and the widow. The one who serves God is heard and his petitions find their way to God and the Most High will respond.

Responsive Psalm Psalm 34:2-3, 17-18, 19, 23: "The Lord hears the cry of the poor."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Second Letter to Timothy: Paul tells Timothy that his own time on earth is almost completed. He has finished the race. He has kept the faith. The Lord will be the last judge and award him his reward in heaven. The Lord has stood by him and given him strength. Paul says that his goal has been to have the word of God heard by all the Gentiles and accepted by them.

Gospel of Luke 18:9-14: Jesus told this parable to those who felt they alone were righteous and all others were lowly. Two people went to the Temple to pray: one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector (who was considered a sinner by those who were forced to pay taxes to the Roman occupiers). The Pharisee prayed with no humility and thanked God that he was not like all the others who were sinners. He boasted about his fasting, his alms giving and his righteousness. One the other hand, the tax collector stood at a distance, beating his chest in a sign of penance and prayed to God that He would be merciful to him, a lowly tax collector. Jesus said that the latter went home forgiven and justified, but not the former. This Gospel story ends with the well-known phrase: "Whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and the one who humbles himself will be exalted"
