SEPTEMBER 7TH

Grandparents Day was created by proclamation by President Jimmy Carter in 1978 to be celebrated on the first Sunday after Labor Day (this year September 7th). It honors the love, wisdom, culture, and connection passed down by grandparents to their progeny. The theme of this year's observance is "Stories From the Table," which honors the food, family, and wisdom shared across generations. Whether you're gathering around the table, swapping recipes, or simply sharing stories, it's a chance to strengthen intergenerational connections in your family and community on that Sunday.

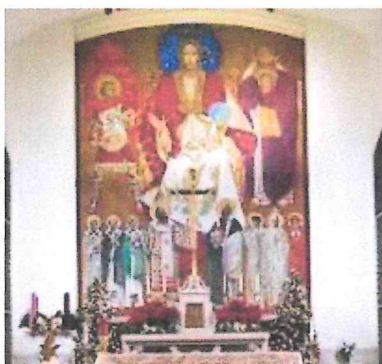
CHALLENGE FOR SEPTEMBER

[A] **Gabriel** appears in 4 occasions in scripture: twice appearing to Daniel (Daniel 8:16 and Daniel 9:21), once to Zechariah, the father of John the Baptist (Luke 1:19) and once to Mary to announce the birth of Jesus (Luke 1:26).

Michael appears in Jude 9 and Revelation 12:7-9, in both instances, challenging the devil and the powers of Satan, driving him out of heaven.

In the Book of Tobit, **Raphael** appears as a traveling guide to Tobit's son to assist him on his journey, protect him, and help him find a wife. He later is identified as being an Archangel in disguise (Tobit 12:11).

[B] While angels are mentioned generically in the Bible, no other angels are identified by name. Catholic tradition identifies another Archangel known as **Uriel** who is mentioned in the Apocryphal Book of Esdras. If you are ever in the sanctuary of St. Basil the Great Church in Vallejo, check out the huge mural behind the altar (as shown below). Jesus is seated on His throne and to His right is Archangel **Michael** (with his sword) and to His left is Archangel **Uriel** (holding aloft a disc of the sun)



[C] Besides Archangels, a number of different classes or types of angels are mentioned in the Bible such as Seraphim (Isaiah 6:2-6), Cherubim (Genesis 3:24, Ezekiel 28:14), Thrones (Colossians 1:16), Principalities and Powers (Ephesians 6:12). Others, though not mentioned specifically by name or class, are inferred by Biblical scholars as being types of angels such as Dominions or Dominations, Virtues and Guardian Angels. [D] Scripture nowhere states that an angel is "assigned" to an individual; angels were sometimes sent to individuals, but there is no mention of permanent assignment. Such "guardian angels," however, were hypothesized by St. Basil the Great in the 4th Century: "Beside each believer stands an angel as protector and shepherd leading him to life." (As recorded in the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* #336).

[E] In the Synoptic Gospels, Satan tempts Jesus in the desert and is identified as the cause of illness and temptation. In the Book of Revelation, Satan appears as a Great Red Dragon, who is defeated by Michael the Archangel and cast down from Heaven (as mentioned above). He is later bound for one thousand years, but is briefly set free before being ultimately defeated and cast into the Lake of Fire. In each of these instances, the devil is generically referred to as "Satan." The name Lucifer was added much later in Christian lore. The word Lucifer is derived from the Latin term "light bearer" or "morning star" (Isaiah 14:12) which refers to what Satan was called before the fall from grace and the rebellion against God (Revelation 12:7-9. Luke 10:18)

SUNDAY MASS READINGS FOR SEPTEMBER

Sunday, August 31st (22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Book of Sirach 3:17-18, 20, 28-29 - The people are warned to be humble, for those with humility will find favor with God. Those who conduct themselves with humility will be loved more than those who go around giving gifts out of pride. Be attentive to the needy and give alms to atone for sins.

Responsive Psalm 68:4-5, 6-7, 10-11 - "God, in your goodness, you have made a home for the poor."

Epistle Reading from the Letter to the Hebrews 12:18-19, 22-24 - The people are not destined to gloom and darkness nor to storms. They have been allowed to approach the City of God, the new Jerusalem, and been able to see countless angels and heavenly beings who have been enrolled in heaven. Jesus is the mediator of this new kingdom and the spirits of the just have been made perfect.

Gospel of Luke 14:1, 7-14 - While Jesus was eating at a table where people were choosing their places of honor He told them a parable: A guest who was invited to a wedding banquet placed himself at a place of honor. But the host tells him that a more distinguished guest has arrived who is to be placed at the spot of honor and he must go down to the lowest place and will be embarrassed, Jesus says instead, when you are invited, you should go and take the lowest place so that the host will come up to you and tell you to move to a higher position, and you will enjoy esteem by those around you. Jesus says that when you host a dinner, don't invite only those who are likely to repay you with a dinner of their own. Instead, invite the poor and crippled even though they may never invite you back in return. If you do this, you will be repaid by your Father in heaven at the resurrection of the truly righteous.

Sunday, September 7th (23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Book of Wisdom 9:13-18 - The deliberations and plans of mortals are unsure and timid. But God's counsel in heaven can give us wisdom and the Holy Spirit can be sent from on high. Our body burdens our soul and the earth weighs down our mind. Our paths on earth are made straight only because of the Lord.

Responsive Psalm 3-6, 12-14, 7 - "In every age, O Lord, you have been our refuge."

Epistle Reading from The Letter of St. Paul to Philemon 9-10, 12-17 - Paul sends Onesimus back to Philemon so that he may serve Philemon: not as a slave, but as a brother. Paul tells him to welcome Onesimus as himself.

Gospel of Luke 14:24-33 - Jesus tells the crowd that anyone who does not carry his own cross and come after Him cannot be His disciple. If anyone is building a tower, do they not sit down and plan the project and insure that they have the resources to build it? Or if a king goes into battle, would he not sit down and make a battle plan to insure that he has enough troops and enough resources? Similarly Jesus tells the people that they must renounce all of their possessions or they cannot be His disciples.

Sunday, September 14th (Feast of the Exaltation of the Holy Cross)

A reading from The Book of Numbers 21:4-9 - On the long journey out of Egypt, the people complained to Moses and to God about the lack of food and water. God sent serpents who bit and killed many people. They then went to Moses and begged for forgiveness from God for their lack of faith. God told Moses to make a bronze serpent on a pole and let the people look at it. All who had been bitten looked at the serpent and were cured.

Responsive Psalm 78:1-2, 34-38 - "Do not forget the works of the Lord!"

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Philippians 2:6-11 - Paul tells the people that Jesus took the form of a slave in human likeness and humbled Himself even to the point of death on a cross. God exalted Jesus, such that at the name of Jesus, every knee should bend in heaven, on earth and under the earth, and every tongue should profess that Jesus Christ is Lord in the Glory of God the Father.

Gospel of John 3:13-17 - Jesus said to Nicodemus that just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so too must the Son of Man be lifted up so that all might have eternal life through the Son of God.

Sunday, September 21st (25th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Prophet Amos 8:4-7 - The prophet warns the people that if they ignore the needy and destroy the poor, if they cheat those they sell to, the Lord will never forget the evil things that they have done.

Responsive Psalm 113:1-2, 4-8 - "Do not forget the works of the Lord!"

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's First Letter to Timothy - Paul tells the people that they must pray and give thanksgiving even for the kings and those in authority, God wishes everyone to be saved and learn the truth - even those we oppose. There is one God and one mediator between God and us - the man, Jesus, who gave Himself for all. We should all pray in every place without any anger or arguments toward others.

Gospel of Luke 16:1-13 - Jesus tells the parable of the steward who squandered the property of a rich man. The man called the servant to prepare a full account of what he owed. The servant went to those who owed him and forgave some of their debts in the hope of being welcomed into their house when the rich man released him. The master commended the dishonest steward for acting with prudence and mercy.

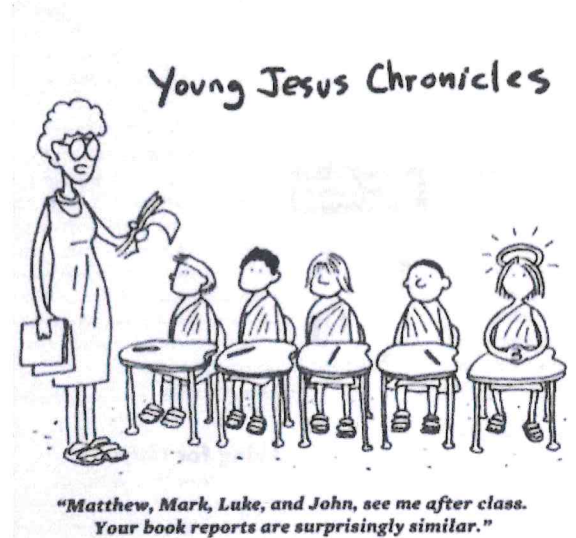
Sunday, September 28th (26th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Prophet Amos 6:1, 4-7 - Do not be complacent by living comfortably and eating cattle from the fold. Do not sit back and just make music, drink wine to excess and anoint yourself with expensive oils. Such people will be the first to be exiled and their revelry will be done away with.

Responsive Psalm 146:7-10 - "Praise the Lord, my soul!"

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's First Letter to Timothy 6:11-16 - Be men of God. Be righteous, faithful, loving, patient and gentle. Keep the commandments without wavering. Wait for the appearance of the Lord. To Him be honor and eternal power.

Gospel of Luke 16:19-31 - Jesus told this parable to the Pharisees: A rich man dressed well and dined well each day. At the man's door lay a poor man covered with sores whose name was Lazarus. He did not have fine clothes and he would gladly have eaten the scraps from the rich man's table. Both the poor man and the rich man died. The poor one was lifted by the angels to heaven; the other was buried and went to the netherworld. This man cried up to Abraham in heaven to send Lazarus down with but a drop of water to quench his thirst. Abraham told the man, however, that on earth he had received what was luxuriant while Lazarus received nothing. But now, Lazarus is comforted while the man is tormented. Neither man can cross to where the other is. The rich man in despair then asked Abraham to send Lazarus down to earth and warn his five brothers lest they also will be condemned to the underworld. Abraham told him that if his brothers had not bothered to listen to Moses and the prophets, then they wouldn't listen to someone who would come back from the dead.

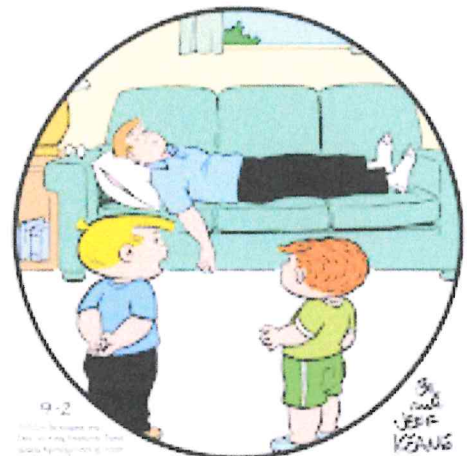
