NOVEMBER 1ST AND 2ND

November 1st in the Church's calendar is listed as the Feast of All Saints and November 2nd is listed as the Feast of All Souls. In most years, All Saints (November 1st) is honored as a Holy Day of Obligation. This year, however, due to the juxtaposition of the two feast days being on a Saturday and Sunday, the obligation of attending Mass on All Saints gives way to the Church allowing us to attend Mass on either the Saturday or the Sunday, and having it count for the Holy Day and for the normal Sunday obligation. Feasts for both All Souls and All Saints will be celebrated together on Saturday at the 5:15 Mass and on Sunday at all three Masses. Again, we do not need to attend Mass on both days in order to fulfill our duty, as either day this year will fulfill our weekly as well as our special feast day obligations.

CHALLENGE FOR NOVEMBER: CHRONOLOGICAL HISTORY OF . . .

Halloween - This tradition actually began as a Celtic festival in pre-Christian times when people would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off ghosts. This occurred on the night before their new year when the Celts believed the boundary between the living and the dead became blurred, allowing spirits to return to earth. Hence, beware of spirits!

All Saints Day - In early centuries, Christians honored martyrs who died for their faith and as the number of martyrs grew, the Church established common days to honor martyrs in major locations throughout the world and on varying days of the calendar year. Pope Boniface IV set a common date for All Saints Day as May 13th. In the 8th Century, Pope Gregory II unified all of these observances by setting November 1st as the date across the Church when he dedicated a chapel in St. Peter's Basilica to all saints, not just martyrs. Hence, All Saints Day.

All Hallows Eve Christians began incorporating some of the Celtic traditions (as mentioned above) and they celebrated the night before All Saints Day as All Hallows' Eve (Hallow meaning to make holy or to treat with great respect). Over time, All Hallows' Eve became known as Halloween. A separate Halloween celebration became more prominent in America with the arrival of Irish and Scottish immigrants in the 19th Century.

All Souls Day - This feast was established by the Church in the 10th Century to pray for the souls of the dead believed to be in Purgatory (having prayed for the saints the day before whom we know are in heaven). Prayers and alms were given on All Souls' Day, based on the theological belief that the prayers of the living could help the souls of the dead achieve final purification and enter heaven.

Thanksgiving - The history of Thanksgiving includes a 1621 harvest feast shared by Wampanoag people and English settlers, which is often called the "First Thanksgiving" but was not the beginning of a national holiday. The holiday was officially established much later, with President Lincoln proclaiming a national Thanksgiving in 1863 following the Civil War, and a law later fixing the date to the fourth Thursday of November.

SUNDAY MASS READINGS FOR NOVEMBER

Sunday, October 26th (30th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

<u>A reading from Sirach 35:12-14, 16-18</u>: The prophet says that the Lord is a God of Justice and shows no partiality. He hears the cries of the poor, the oppressed, the orphan and the widow. The one who serves God is heard and his petitions find their way to God and the Most High will respond.

Responsive Psalm 34:2-3, 17-18, 19, 23: "The Lord hears the cry of the poor."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Second Letter to Timothy: Paul tells Timothy that his own time on earth is almost completed. He has finished the race. He has kept the faith. The Lord will be the last judge and award him his reward in heaven. The Lord has stood by him and given him strength. Paul says that his goal has been to have the word of God heard by all the Gentiles and accepted by them.

Gospel of Luke 18:9-14: Jesus told this parable to those who felt they alone were righteous and all others were lowly. Two people went to the Temple to pray: one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector (who was considered a sinner by those who were forced to pay taxes to the Roman occupiers). The Pharisee prayed with no humility and thanked God that he was not like all the others who were sinners. He boasted about his fasting, his alms giving and his righteousness. One the other hand, the tax collector stood at a distance, beating his chest in a sign of penance and prayed to God that He would be merciful to him, a lowly tax collector. Jesus said that the latter went home forgiven and justified, but not the former. This Gospel story ends with the well-known phrase: "Whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and the one who humbles himself will be exalted"

Sunday, November 2nd (All Souls Sunday)

A reading from the Book of Wisdom 3:1-9 - The souls of the just are in the hand of God. They are at peace. They are worthy of God's presence. Their hope is full of immortality. They abide in God's love.

Responsive Psalm 23:1-6 - "The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans 5:5-11 - God proved His love for us for while we were sinners, Christ died for us. The love of God has been poured over us through the Holy Spirit.

Gospel of John 6:37-40 - Jesus told the crowds that He will not reject anyone who comes to Him. Everyone who sees and believes in Him will have eternal life, and they shall be raised on the last day.

Sunday, November 9th

A reading from the Book of Ezekiel 47:1-2, 8-9, 12 - Ezekiel tells of a vision he had where an angel took him to the temple and there was water flowing out. The angel told him that the water flows into rivers and fish and animals and trees thrive because of the water's nourishment. These will provide sustenance for all people.

Responsive Psalm 46:2-3, 5-6, 8-9 - "The waters of the river gladden the city of God, the holy dwelling of the Most High!"

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's First Letter to the Corinthians 3:9-11, 16-17 - Jesus laid the foundation for the building of the temple which is the foundation of all humanity. The Spirit of God dwells in each of us. We are the temple of God. We are holy in His eyes.

Gospel of John 2:13-22 - When Jesus approached the temple, He saw those who were the money changers and those who sold the animals for offerings. He drove them out of the temple area and told them not to make His Father's house a marketplace. "Destroy this temple and I will raise it in 3 days."

Sunday, November 16th (33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Book of Malachi 3:19-20 - A day his coming that the evildoers will be stubble and set on fire. But for the just, the sun of justice will arise with its healing rays.

Responsive Psalm 98:5-9 - "The Lord comes to rule the earth with justice."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Second Letter to the Thessalonians 3:7-12 - We work so as not to burden anyone of you, says Paul. He says that he wants to present himself as a model of righteousness. He says no one should act in a disorderly way, but should work quietly in the name of the Lord.

Gospel of Luke 21:5-19 - Jesus warns the crowds that a day will come when the temple will be destroyed. He precedes such an event with days of war and insurrection, earthquakes, famines and plagues. Some of them will be hated because of the name of Jesus and put to death because they believe in Him. Jesus will give them wisdom and courage to preserve their lives.

Sunday, November 23rd (Feast of Christ the King)

A reading from the Second Book of Samuel 5:1-3 - After Saul was King, the Lord told David to shepherd His People. The people went to David and David made an agreement with them in the name of the Lord, and the people anointed him King of Israel.

Responsive Psalm 122:1-5 - "Let us go rejoicing to the house of the Lord."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Colossians 1:12-20 - The Lord delivered the people from darkness and presented to them the Kingdom of His Son. The whole world was created through the Redeemer and through Him all things have been reconciled, making peace by the good of the cross

Gospel of Luke 23:35-43 - While on the cross, Jesus was jeered and ridiculed. Even one of the criminals crucified with Him rebuked Him and belittle Him. But the other criminal was adamant that Jesus had done nothing criminal, and asked Jesus to remember him when he comes into His kingdom. Jesus said to him, "Today, you will be with me in Paradise."

Sunday, November 30th (First Sunday of Advent)

A reading from The Book of Isaiah 2:1-5 - This reading tells of a vision given to Isaiah about the mountain of the Lord's house. People climbed the mountain to the house of the God of Jacob so they could be instructed. When peace prevails, people will beat their swords into plowshares. They will all walk in the light of the Lord when no one trains for war.

Responsive Psalm 122:1-9 - "Let us go rejoicing to the house of the Lord."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter too the Romans 13:11-14 - Paul tells the people to awake from their slumber, to throw off darkness and put on light. They should put on the Lord Jesus Christ.

Gospel of Matthew 24:37-44 - Jesus reminded the people that before the flood in the days of Noah, the people disregarded the signs of the deluge to come. So too will be the coming of the Son of Man. No one knows when the day will come, so stay awake. It will be at an hour they will not expect, that the Son of Man will come.
