FIRST AMERICAN SAINT?

Who was the first American saint? Tough question because there might be two possible answers! The first American citizen to be beatified and canonized as a saint was Maria Francesca Cabrini, born in Italy in 1850. She migrated to the United States in 1887 and became a US citizen in 1909. She had to endure anti-Italian prejudice in New York City and reached out especially to other immigrants in the city



to provide them with health and education opportunities. Known as Mother Cabrini, she founded the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus that today provides health care, education and other services to the poor in 15 nations around the world. In addition, she began 67 schools, orphanages and hospitals throughout the country. Because of her

success in this country, she was called on to create missions in Latin America and back in Europe. After her death in 1917, her order began the campaign for her sainthood, and she was beatified by the Vatican in 1938 and was canonized a saint by Pope Pius XII in 1946. In 1950, she was given the special title of being the patron saint of immigrants. Her feast day is November 13th, the date of her beatification.

But what about a second possible answer to the question? Kateri Tekakwitha was born in 1656 in a Mohawk village in present-day New York. She and her family contracted smallpox in an epidemic brought on by contact with Europeans. She was the only one of the family to survive and she was raised by French Jesuit missionaries who converted her to Catholicism at the age of 19. She took a vow of celibacy and moved to a Jesuit mission village near Montreal in Canada, where she was well-known and respected for her piety, good works, devotion to Jesus Christ, her work ethic and her dedicated prayers for her fellow Native people. She died in 1680 at the age of only 24. She was not beatified until 1980 by Pope John Paul II and canonized by Pope Benedict XVI in 2012. She is considered the first Native American saint. Her feast day is this month on July 14th.

JULY CHALLENGE

1. Trick question! The Bell was actually cast in England prior to the Revolutionary War. It was transported by ship to Philadelphia to be hung there in the Pennsylvania State House (now called Independence Hall).
2. The Bell arrived in early 1753, was hung in the bell tower of the State House and was first rung there on March 10, 1753.
3. This actually is true about the first time it was rung, but that occurred on March 10th of 1753, not July of 1776. The Bell cracked, was removed, melted down and recast before being replaced in the bell tower. It remained in place and continued to be rung during the next couple of years for various occasions. It was rung a couple of days after the 4th of July (on July 8th to be specific) when the Declaration of Independence was actually read aloud on the steps of Independence Hall. No problems yet. But when it was rung on February 22, 1846 (to commemorate the birthday of George Washington), it did crack with the fracture that remains until today and has never been rung again (although it is tapped on rare, special occasions with a mallet, as probably will be done this coming 4th of July to commemorate the 250th anniversary of the Declaration).
4. Believe it or not, the misspelling of the state (then colony) "Pensylvania" is embossed on the face of the Bell - one of the most famous "typographicals" in history!
5. On the face of the Bell is a citation from Leviticus 25:10: "Proclaim liberty throughout all the land unto all the inhabitants thereof."

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SECOND CHALLENGE

1. Before taking on its official name, this area along Hiway 29 was known as "Napa Junction," due to the junction of railroad lines here.
2. According to legend, in the 1800s, this area was inhabited by Native Americans, Mexicans and Americans. Hence, our Canyon was home to a variety of Americans, and the name stuck.
3. From 1950 through 1990, this unincorporated area saw the need for autonomy of services and official "city-hood" to be more than a subdivision of Napa County. On January 1, 1992, a town hall meeting voted to officially incorporate and confirm a newly elected city council (which included our own Joan Bennett).
4. Prior to July 1995, American Canyon addresses used the nearby ZIP Code 94589 (the northern part of Vallejo, which is even in a different county). There was a small branch post office on Crawford Way, with minimal services, and mail delivery was slow. Through the effort of the local Congressman, American Canyon was given its own unique ZIP Code of 94503 on July 1, 1995.

SUNDAY MASS READINGS FOR JULY

Sunday, June 28th (13th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from 2 Kings 4:8-11, 14-16 - During Elisha's travels, he met a kind women who, with her husband, gave him food and a place of lodging. Elisha wanted to do something in return for her, and when he found out that the couple was childless, he called the woman and told her that by that time next year, she will have borne a baby son.

Responsive Psalm Psalm 89:2-3, 16-17, 18-19 - "Forever I will sing the goodness of the Lord."

Epistle Reading from the Letter of St. Paul to the Romans 6:3-4, 8-11 - We who were baptized into Christ Jesus have also been baptized into His death. As Christ was raised from the dead, we also will be raised and can die no more. Be dead to sin and live for God in Jesus Christ.

Gospel of Matthew 10:37-42 - Jesus said to his Apostles that they must love Him even more than they love their parents or their children. They must take up their cross and follow Him. All should receive the word of prophets and welcome those who are righteous. All should give water to those who are thirsty even the little children because you will surely not lose your reward.

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Sunday, July 5th (14th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Prophet Zechariah 9:9-10 - Rejoice and shout for joy, Jerusalem, for a king is coming who will be our savior, riding on a donkey and proclaiming peace to the nations.

Responsive Psalm 145:1-2, 8-11, 13-14 - "I will praise your name for ever, my king and my God."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans 8:9, 11-13 - The Spirit of God dwells in each of us. Whoever does not have this Spirit does not belong to God. It is the Spirit who raised Christ from the dead. Live according to the Spirit, put to death the deeds of the body, and you will live forever.

Gospel of Matthew 11:25-30 - Jesus exclaimed that all who labor and are burdened should take their cares to Him and He will give them rest. The Father knows the Son and the Son knows the Father.

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Sunday, July 12th (15th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Prophet Isaiah 55:10-11 - Just as rain and snow come down and water the earth, so too the Lord's words come down through the prophets and do His will for whom they were sent.

Responsive Psalm 65:10-14 - "The seed that falls on good ground will yield a fruitful harvest."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans 8:18-23 - All of creation is groaning for the freedom from slavery and corruption. One day, the glory will be revealed to us as we wait for the redemption of our bodies. Then we will know the freedom of being children of God.

Gospel of Matthew 13:1-23 - Jesus taught the crowds using the parable of the sower: Some seed fell on the path and the birds ate it up. Some seed fell on rocky ground where it had little soil. Some seed fell among the thorns and was choked off. But some seed fell on rich soil and produced much fruit. The disciples asked Jesus why He taught using parables and He said that the mysteries of the kingdom of heaven cannot easily be understood by the many. Jesus then went on to explain the metaphor of the parable so the disciples could hear the words and would understand the mysteries.

Sunday, July 19th (16th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from the Book of Wisdom 12:13, 16-19 - There is only one God, the source of justice, who judges with clemency, who teaches that those who are just must be kind, and who must repent from sins.

Responsive Psalm 86:5-6, 9-10, 15-16 - "Lord, you are good and forgiving."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans 8:26-27 - We may not know how to pray, but the Spirit intercedes for the holy ones according to God's will.

Gospel of Matthew 13:24-43 - Jesus tells another parable to the crowds: The farmer sowed good seed in his field, but at night, his enemy came and sowed weeds throughout the field. When the wheat and weeds came up together, the farmer said that his workers should harvest both - tie the weeds into bundles for burning but gather the wheat into his barn. He told another parable of someone who planted a tiny mustard seed in the field which grew up to be a huge bush. Yet another parade about heaven being like yeast just as mixing yeast into the dough produces a whole batch that was leavened.

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Sunday, July 26th (17th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from 1 Kings 3:5, 7-12 - The Lord appeared to Solomon in a dream and offered to fill any wish of Solomon's. Since Solomon felt unprepared to lead the people, he asked the Lord for a wise and understanding heart so he could judge the people and distinguish right from wrong. And the Lord was pleased.

Responsive Psalm 119:57, 72, 76-77, 127-130 - "Lord, I love your commands."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans 8:28-30 - Those who were predestined by God to do good have been called to be justified and to be glorified.

Gospel of Matthew 13:44-52 - Another parable from Jesus about finding a treasure in a field or searching for fine pearls. What is good is kept; what is bad gets thrown away. So too, the wicked will be separated from the righteous, with the wicked being discarded.

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Sunday, August 2nd (18th Sunday in Ordinary Times)

A reading from Isaiah 55:1-3 - All you who are thirsty, come to the water. All who have no money, come and receive grain to eat. The covenant promised to David will be granted to those who listen to the word.

Responsive Psalm 145:8-9, 15-18 - "The hand of the Lord feeds us; he answers all our needs."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans 8:35, 37-39 - Nothing should separate us from the love of God through Jesus Christ - nether death nor life, neither present things nor future things. No anguish, distress, persecution nor famine, peril or the sword should separate us from God.

Gospel of Matthew 14:13-21 - Jesus was distressed to hear of the death of John the Baptist. He went away to a quiet place but the crowds followed Him. The disciples told Jesus to dismiss the crowds so they could go home and eat, but Jesus told the disciples to feed the people themselves. But they told Jesus that they had only five loaves of bread and two fish. As we know well, Jesus told the crowd to recline and he distributed food to them so that all had their fill.
