



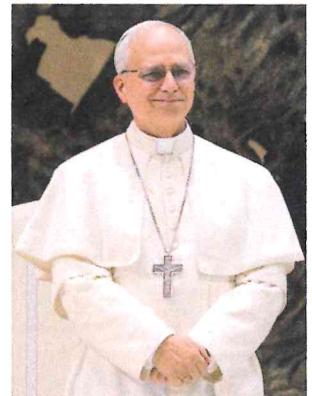

HOLY FAMILY PARISH - UNIQUE?

How many Holy Family Parishes are there in California? How many in the Greater Bay Area? How did our own space here in American Canyon come to be known as Holy Family Parish?

There are actually 18 churches/parishes around California that are dedicated to the Holy Family. Of these, 5 others are in our general area. Here they are with their locations and years of origination (remember that Holy Family in American Canyon was begun in 1994):

- † Holy Family San Jose founded in 1883
- † Holy Family Tracy founded in 1884
- † Holy Family Citrus Heights founded in 1947
- † Holy Family Modesto founded in 1950
- † Holy Family Mission Rutherford (a mission of St. Joan of Arc Parish) founded in 1992

But back to 1994 - A few Masses were held in American Canyon through the impetus of Mike Simmons, our soon-to-be ordained Deacon, with priests from St. John's in Napa presiding. One of those priests was Fr. Pat Stephenson, a recently retired Air Force Chaplain. At one local meeting, Bishop Patrick Ziemann announced that he was designating the Catholic Community of American Canyon to be a parish, a stand-alone parish, not a mission parish of St. John's. The Bishop told Fr. Pat privately that he would be the first pastor. During the meeting, he solicited from Fr. Pat and Deacon Mike for possible names for the new parish.

During his Air Force days, Fr. Pat had associated with a couple of parishes named Holy Family and he liked that name for a couple of reasons - rather than centering on one saintly name for devotion, people could relate by showing inclusive devotion to Jesus, His mother Mary and His earthly father Joseph. Thus, Fr. Pat met with the Bishop and on Pentecost Sunday, 1994, the first official Mass was held in American Canyon at the newly-established Church of the Holy Family. And here we are!

The Feast of the Holy Family is celebrated each year on the Sunday between Christmas and Epiphany. P.S. Did any of you attend a Catholic grammar school where the nuns would have you put **JMJ** at the top of your papers (for Jesus, Mary & Joseph)?

AUGUST CHALLENGE

1. A little more than a year now. He was chosen to be Pope on May 8, 2025.

2. He was born Robert Francis Prevost on the South Side of Chicago.

3. He has always been a rabid Chicago White Sox fan, even having attended a World Series game in 2005 at Cominsky Park. Following his elevation to Pope, the White Sox installed a graphic at the stadium marking the seat His Holiness sat in at that game. He has been gifted with the final out baseball of that game along with a White Sox jersey with the #14 on it (to represent Leo the XIV).

4. The then Father Prevost was ordained to the priesthood on June 19, 1982 into the Order of the Augustinians. He is the first and only Pope to have been in the Order of St. Augustine. Similarly, Pope Francis was the first and only Pope to have been in the Jesuits (Society of Jesus). There have been four Popes who have been Dominicans and multiple Popes who have been Franciscans, but none more recently than the 18th Century.

5. Pope Leo worked for many years in Peru, becoming a diocesan archbishop there and even becoming a Peruvian citizen. He speaks fluent Spanish along with English, Italian, French, and Portuguese. He can even read Latin and German.

6. True, as noted above - also Peruvian citizenship.

7. False, Pope Francis appointed him to the Pontifical Commission for Latin America in 2023, at which time, elevating him to be a Cardinal.

8. He was elected on the fourth total ballot. Three ballots were taken on the first day of the conclave, and he was elected on the first ballot of the second day. Throughout history, this was a rather quick final decision made by the College of Cardinals to choose a new Pope.

9. False: When a Pope dies, his papal ring is smashed and a new one will be fabricated specifically for the new Pontiff. It is a signet-style ring that is used by the Pope to imprint official seals using sealing wax.



10. Pope Leo XIII served as Pope from 1878 to 1903, so it has been quite a while since we have had a Pope Leo.

Go to the daily readings for August 6th. We celebrate the Feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord on that day. Read especially the Gospel for that day from Matthew 17:1-9 and study the marvelous details of the event. As Peter says, "Lord, it is good that we are here today."



SUNDAY MASS READINGS FOR AUGUST

Sunday, August 2nd (18th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from Isaiah 55:1-3 - All you who are thirsty, come to the water. All who have no money, come and receive grain to eat. The covenant promised to David will be granted to those who listen to the word.

Responsive Psalm 145:8-9, 15-18 - "The hand of the Lord feeds us; he answers all our needs."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans 8:35, 37-39 - Nothing should separate us from the love of God through Jesus Christ - neither death nor life, neither present things nor future things. No anguish, distress, persecution nor famine, peril or the sword should separate us from God.

Gospel of Matthew 14:13-21 - Jesus was distressed to hear of the death of John the Baptist. He went away to a quiet place but the crowds followed Him. The disciples told Jesus to dismiss the crowds so they could go home and eat, but Jesus told the disciples to feed the people themselves. But they told Jesus that they had only five loaves of bread and two fish. As we know well, Jesus told the crowd to recline and he distributed food to them so that all had their fill.

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Sunday, August 9th (19th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from 1 Kings 19:9, 11-13 - At the entrance to a cave, Elijah was told to stand watch because the Lord would be coming by. After a strong wind, an earthquake, and a fire, the Lord did not appear in any one of those. But the Lord appeared in a quiet whisper which Elijah heard clearly.

Responsive Psalm 85:9-14 - "Lord, let us see your kindness, and grant us your salvation."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans 9:1-5 - Paul tells the people of Rome that he speaks the truth and bears witness to the Holy Spirit; and that Christ reigns over all.

Gospel of Matthew 14:22-33 - The disciples were on about that was being tossed by the waves. Jesus appears to them walking on the water toward the boat and frightens them. Jesus told them not to be afraid. Peter got out of the boat and started toward Jesus, but he began to sink. Jesus stretched out His hand and caught Peter, to which Peter said, "Truly you are the Son of God."

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Sunday, August 16th (20th Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from Isaiah 56:1, 6-7 - The Lord says that His justice is about to be revealed, so the people should do what is right and just. Those who join themselves to the Lord and keep His commandments will be accepted in the Lord's house, a house of prayer for all peoples.

Responsive Psalm 67:2-3, 5, 6, 8 - "O God, let all the nations praise you!"

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans 11:13-15, 29-32 - Paul talks to the Gentiles as an apostle to the Gentiles. The people once disobeyed God but have now received mercy.

Gospel of Matthew 15:21-28 - While on a journey, Jesus is called to by a Canaanite woman whose daughter is possessed by a devil. At first, Jesus denies her, but the woman persists and Jesus notices the woman's great faith and grants the woman's wish. The daughter was healed from that hour.

Sunday, August 23rd (21st Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from Isaiah 22:19-23 - The Lord rebukes the master of the palace and then clothes one of His own servants in a royal robe and gives the servant authority over the master. He shall become the father of many inhabitants of Jerusalem and the key to the House of David will be placed on his shoulder.

Psalms 138:1-2, 2-3, 6, 8 - "Lord, your love is eternal; do not forsake the work of your hands."

Epistle Reading from Paul's Letter to the Romans 11:33-36 - The wisdom and knowledge of God are deep riches. His judgements are above reproach. All things are from Him. To Him be glory forever.

Gospel of Matthew 16:13-20 - Jesus asks His disciples who people say He is. Peter says that He is the Christ, the Son of God. Jesus approves of the answer and declares that Peter is the rock upon which He will build His church. Whatever is bound on earth will be bound in heaven and whatever is loosed on earth will be loosed in heaven. Jesus orders Peter not to tell anyone that He is the Christ.

Sunday, August 30th (22nd Sunday in Ordinary Time)

A reading from Jeremiah 20:7-9 - Jeremiah bemoans that he has become an object of ridicule because he speaks about the Lord. He tries not to speak about the Lord, but he can no longer remain silent.

Responsive Psalm Psalm 63:2, 3-4, 5-6, 8-9 - "My soul is thirsting for you, O Lord my God."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans - Paul urges the people to offer themselves as living sacrifices to God. They should discern what is the will of God that is good and perfect and pleasing.

Gospel of Matthew 16:21-27 - Jesus begins to tell His disciples that He must go to Jerusalem where he will suffer greatly at the hands of the elders and chief priests. Peter rebuked Jesus for this sort of talk, but Jesus tells Peter that he is an obstacle to Him. He tells the disciples that they must take up their crosses and follow Him. Whoever loses their life for Jesus' sake will find it and will profit in eternity.

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Sunday, September 6th (23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time)

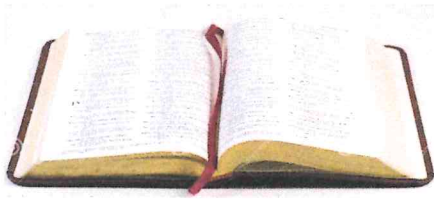
A reading from Ezekiel 33:7-9 - When God tells the wicked that they will die, Ezekiel should speak out to dissuade them from their wicked ways. If the wicked still refuse to turn away from evil, they will die but Ezekiel shall save himself for trying to do the will of the Lord.

Responsive Psalm 95:1-2, 6-7, 8-9 - "If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts."

Epistle Reading from St. Paul's Letter to the Romans 13:8-10 - Paul tells the people to owe nothing to anyone except to love everyone. The commandments are summed up in the saying that you should love your neighbor as yourself. Love is the fulfillment of the law.

Gospel of Matthew 18:15-20 - If your brother sins against you, go tell him his fault between you and him. If he refuses to listen, take two or three with you to provide testimony. If he still refuses to listen, take it to the church. If two of you on earth agree about anything for which you are praying, it will be granted to you by Jesus' heavenly Father. Where two or three are gathered together in the name of the Lord, He is there in their midst.
